The longer handle will not only save climbing trees and ladders, but will do an effective pruning job so that suckers won't be robbing the soil of moisture and fertility, shading the fruit, lowering quality and preventing spray materials from reaching all parts of the tree. • The saws are obtamable at most local dealers, and bulletins are avail-able at the county agent's office on using this type of saw when following the "thin wood" method of pruning.




