Odds and Ends Here and There

After growing to record num-bers in 1946, Michigan sportmen are still on the increase, fishing license sales for the first quarter of 1947 indicate. With the major fishing seasone yet to begin, fishing license sales already are 13 percent greater than at the same

time a year ago.

Last year the conservation department issued 2,023,309 hunting and fishing licenses. Anglers got 987,188 of them, deer and small game hunters 1,036,121. The most spectacular increase was in the number of deer hunters which grew from 268,587 in 1945 to 350,056 in 1946.

Since V-J Day, according to VA reports, the number of its hospitals has jumped from \$7 to 128, or 29 percent, the number of its available beds from 78,944 to 100,541, or 27 percent, and the number of applications for hospital and domiciliary care has risen from 32,500 to 73,500, or 126 percent.

Trout fishing will open the season this Saturday, April 26. Anglers are expected to be out as early as 12:01 a. m., although conditions aren't as
