Lansing, May 29—The state capital is again sighing with relief. The state legislature, now winding up its fifth month, is due to go ome next week.

An adjournment of the legislature is always an occasion for re-loicing by legislators, state officials and legislative agents. This

Although Republicans have been in complete control of both the House and Senate, leadership has been noticeably wobbly and actions have been quite unpredictable. Michigan produced a total of 141,000 gallons of maple syrup this year, the best crop since 1944, the Federal-State Reporting Service announced.
