**Board of Education Nominating Petitions Due June 14-24 Inc.**

The term of two members of the Lowell Board of Education will expire on July 1 of this year, and in accordance with the law the vacancies will be filled at the annual election which will be held on Monday, July 14, 1947. The terms of Frank Stephens and F. F. Coons terminate. Those who wish to become candidates for the vacancies should file nominating petitions with the Secretary of the Board of Education at any time between June 14 and June 24, inclusive.

Any qualified voter in the district whose name appears in the assessment roll and who is the owner of property so assessed is eligible for the Board of Education. The nominating petitions must be signed by at least fifty registered electors. It is to be noted that electors are not to sign more than two petitions this year. Only the names of those candidates who have qualified by filing these nominating petitions will have their names printed on the ballot.

In another column of this paper there will be found the notice of registration which applies to those people who have not registered as school electors in the School District before. It is hoped that all qualified electors will register so that there will be no difficulties about voting at the election or annual meeting on July 14.

It is also to be noted that the registration is to take place between Monday, June 23, and Saturday, July 5. Nominating petitions are available at my office.

## Sigler and Keyes Feud at Lansing

### Some Observers Inclined to Agree With Governor Regarding Keyes

There's two sides to about everything. That goes for the Sigler-Keyes feud at Lansing.

The governor's ire at reputed "stiffing" of the administration's legislative program by a "handful" of senators was public aired before Michigan Association Press editors in annual session at Higgins Lakes.

Lambasting the senate which he termed "the worst I've known in many years," Governor Sigler charged Lieut. Governor Eugene B. Keyes with playing politics. Keyes encouraged a "small group of prima donnas" to obstruct administration bills, the governor declared.

Sigler said he did not believe in cracking the whip over the legislature. Each branch of government—legislative, judicial and executive—should always remain independent and free of one another.

Several legislative observers who watched the conduct of the Senate during the five-month session are inclined to agree with Governor Sigler as to Keyes' behind-the-scenes meddling. The Dearborn dentist-lawyer-engineer does not like to play second fiddle.

The same persons, however, are critical of the governor's hands-off attitude in getting results from the legislature. They say it just won't work. For example: During critical periods when vital matters were awaiting action, Sigler was apt not to be in Marquette or Washington or elsewhere. His speaking engagements were numerous and frequent.

The Governor's passion for speech making and flying—and the two fit together nicely—led capital observers to several speculations. One conclusion is that the governor is yet to learn the "ropes" of how to get things done; legislators want to see the governor, not his lieutenants; the governor must stay on the job and "crack the whip" with diplomatic persuasion and force; he must develop his own leaders in the House and Senate.

Another speculation is that the Governor does not expect to run for a second term. He is enjoying the power of office and the prestige that goes with it.

Critics of Sigler feel that the governor, faced with an unsuccessful legislative record, has sought to "cover up" his failures by seeking to make others the scapegoat. The McKay "foras", for example, were charged by the governor with attempting to scuttle the program. Then Keyes was blamed in the Higgins Lakes statements.

Our own observation is that there is some truth to both sides of the above situation. We will not go into details. We observe, also, that the administration has 18 months left to complete its record. When you check over what the legislature did during its five-month 1947 session, you will agree with Douglas Graham, chief of the Lansing bureau of the United Press: "Sigler came out of his first legislative bout in fair shape. Most of his program was adopted, although he had to wait until almost the last minute for some of it."

As for the deficit, variously estimated and sure to run into millions, that's a horse of another color. The governor feels that a deficit may help to convince voters that "the surplus" of Lansing is largely fiction and that the sales tax diversion amendment was only another way to force new and higher tax on the taxpayer.

At least, the sales tax issue is still alive. The legislature voted to re-submit the amendment to the voters in November, 1948, along with a move to revise the state constitution.

**New Qualifications For Registration of All School Electors**

In another column of this paper will be found the official notice of registration of electors in Graded School District No. 1, Village of Lowell. It is to be noted that this is not a re-registration, but merely a registration for those who are qualified and have not registered as school electors before. Registration in the village or township does NOT qualify one to vote in the School District.

For the second time in the history of Michigan, anyone may register for school elections who is above the age of twenty-one years and has resided in the State six months and in the district twenty days preceding the election. It is no longer necessary to be a parent or guardian of any child who is on the school census. However, it is still necessary to be the owner of property assessed for taxes in the school district before electors can vote on matters pertaining to the direct expenditure of money. PG-7

"Your assessors and boards of review have given the state appraisals very careful consideration and feel we have an equitable assessment, (still below the state).

## Lowell Man Vanishes

### Newton Grimwood, Proprietor of the Lowell Creamery, Mysteriously Disappears Leaving No Trace Despite Diligent Search; Thought to Be Suffering Amnesia

Everyone in this community has felt deep concern over the absence of Newton I. Grimwood, proprietor of the Lowell Creamery, who dropped from sight, so to speak, about noon last Thursday, June 12. Despite diligent search not a word has since been received as to his whereabouts.

Mr. Grimwood told his wife he had been hit on the head by a brick that had fallen from a building. When the accident occurred he was standing on a ladder doing some repair work.

**Removed to His Home**

Immediately following the accident, Mr. Grimwood was taken to his home by his employee, Mrs. Donald Lind.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Stephens who investigated the case, said that Mrs. Grimwood declared her husband said there was no need of taking an employee away from his work in the creamery to drive him to Grand Rapids as he would be able to hitchhike.

Mrs. Grimwood said that just before her husband started for Grand Rapids ostensibly to buy a new truck, he had had to reach a Lowell physician but without success.

**May Be Amnesia Victim**

"I am sure my husband is suffering amnesia," said Mrs. Grimwood Monday as she carried on at home with her two children while Kent County Sheriff's deputies, State Police and Grand Rapids police continued their search for the 25-year old Lowell Creamery proprietor.

**Long Search Fruitless**

Deputy Stephens, with a body of citizens, veterans and Boy Scouts, searched Friday, Saturday and Sunday but failed to uncover any promising clues.

Deputy Stephens said Monday that every lead he had was exhausted and that until something new turns up he had nothing to report.

Mrs. Grimwood Monday enlarged on a description of her husband. He is about 25 years old, with dark brown hair, blue eyes. He wore a tan silk shirt. He had a short haircut. He does not drink, but smoked heavily. Bowling is his favorite recreation; interested in all sports. He is fond of children. Born and raised on a farm, he also likes farm work.

**In Navy Four Years**

He had been head of the Lowell Creamery for a year, coming to Lowell from Chicago where he and his wife were married. He is a native of Plano, Ill., and a graduate of the University of Illinois.

A veteran of five major engagements in the Pacific theater, he was a gunnery officer on the USS Salt Lake City, a heavy cruiser. He was in the navy four years. He is a member of Lowell Post No. 8308, VFW, and the American Legion.

**DDT WILL NOT KILL ALL GARDEN PESTS**

Home gardeners who think that DDT is an answer to all of their garden insect problems may find that it won't kill the bugs they think it will.

Entomologists at MSC say that the Mexican bean beetle and red spider mites aren't much affected by DDT.

A dust mixture with three percent DDT is effective against most potato and cabbage pests. For controlling aphids on potatoes and thrips on onions, a stronger DDT dust is needed. DDT should not be used on leafy vegetables at the time when the foliage will be used as human food.

**11 Pleas of Guilty From 6 Young Men**

A case of beer and an automobile load of what Deputy Frank Stephens of Lowell described as "young night owls" led Friday to six arrests, 11 pleas of guilty, five fines and six suspended sentences.

According to Stephens, states the Grand Rapids Herald, the whole affair started Thursday evening when six young men set out from Lowell for Ionia. They were Fred Johnson, 21; Frank Huckleberry, 19; Kenneth Yelter, 18, and Stanley Burrows, 17, all of Lowell; Ward Rogers, 21, of Grand Rapids and Howard Peckham, 19, of Ada R2.

Johnson and Rogers purchased a case of beer at Ionia, according to Stephens. Later in the evening Wayne Denmore, 17, also of Lowell, who had been picked up "for a ride", had been poured over him and was otherwise "roughed up" by Huckleberry, Rogers and Johnson, Stephens added.

Arraigned before Justice Willard McIntyre Friday, all six pleaded guilty to a general charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and were given suspended sentences.

Huckleberry was fined \$10 and costs and Rogers and Johnson were assessed costs when they pleaded guilty to a charge of furnishing beer to a minor and were given fines of \$50 each, with alternative of serving 45-day jail terms.

"I hope it was a good lesson to them," said Deputy Stephens, who suggested they "get to bed earlier nights and stay out of trouble."

## Change Made In Mailing System

### Postal Inspectors Announce Mail Must Carry Street Name and Number

Inspectors at the Lowell post office last week authorized a complete change-over from delivery by name in the village to delivery by street address. Mrs. Cecil Bibbler, Lowell postmistress, announced this week.

Lowell delivery, which started in 1921, was begun on a name basis and not according to street names and numbers. With more residents in the village and new homes this name delivery has proven very unsatisfactory and has slowed delivery to many persons. Mail carriers have spent hours learning a complicated sorting and delivery system that has prevented their getting help from clerks in the post office. With the new sorting system that will be put into effect anyone in the post office will be able to sort mail and will be of considerable help during the busy seasons.

This change which is scheduled to go into effect on October 1, means that all mail addressed to persons in the village must carry the street name and number or there will be a delay in delivery.

The village council has been asked to put new signs on all street corners and householders should get numbers and put them on their houses. If there is any question as to the house number, Frank McMahon, who numbered the houses of the town many years ago, will establish the correct number.

All residents on rural routes out of Lowell, must use rural route numbers on their address or their mail will be delayed in delivery. Street names in the rural areas are not proper mail addresses.

The post office has also requested that an extra carrier be authorized, who will deliver parcel post and substitute on the city delivery.

**Daily Bible School Off to Good Start**
