



Avold Poison Ivy Polson ivy can usually be avoided if one learns to recognize its three leaves. The poison can be carried in fire smoke and on animals, It can be caught from a person who has it. If you have been exposed to the poison, wash thoroughly with soap. The United States Public Health Service recommends the application of a ten percent solution of tannic acid in alcohol applied by rubbing motion c10 of blistera. This treatment should be repeated three ar four times at six hour intervals. Authorities feel that no person is really immune to poison lvy because persons may handle it for years without result and then become so seriously ill

of it that they require a month's hospitalization. The weed killer 2-4-D will kill the plant. Kill Insects

Dead mosquitoes and files won't bother or endanger vacationists, and the use of DDT spray is the best way to eliminate the insects at camps or cottages. While travel-ing, commercial insect repellants will keep mosquitoes away. Flowers of sulphur dabbed on stocking and underclothes will help

keep chiggers away. A salt bath each evening may also prevent Michigan has only one poisonou which lives in swampy places and grows to be about three feet long. First aid recommendations for polson snake bites include placing a tourniquet on the limb above the wound, making a small incision on the bite, and sucking out as much venom as possible. It is imperative

to get the patient to a physician as soon as possible after the bite. There's no elixir like a long night's sleep from the sandpoint of physical well being or improving your outlook on life. Keep re gular hours, eat regular meals and get plenty of rest. While motoring, drive carefully. Do not distract other drivers. Do not stand in gararge, barn, or house doors or un-der a tree in a thunder storm.
