

An Open Letter to Our Fuel Oil Customers

We have been aware for some time of the dissatisfaction of some of our customers with the prices which we must charge for fuel oils. Our prices are above the so-called "posted price" for this area. It was with extreme regret that we raised our prices early in the fall. However, this step was forced upon us by the unusual conditions

now prevailing in the petroleum industry. Demand for all petroleum products is at an all-time high, currently running nearly 20% over the war-time peak of 1944-45. Due to circumstances beyond their control, our supplier, the Socony-Vacuum Oil Company was forced to reduce our allocation of fuel oils to about one-half of what we had received from them last winter.

The C. H. Runciman Company then had one of two courses of action to follow:

The first choice above was rejected because we knew that other suppliers in

(2) We could go into the spot market and attempt to purchase the balance of our fuel oil requirements at whatever price was necessary to obtain the oil.

(1) We could deliver to our customers at posted prices one-half of the fuel which we sold to them last winter.

this area would be unable to take on our customers as well as their own. It was then necessary for us to go into the open market and purchase fuel oil wherever we could find it. Most of this oil has been purchased from the Gulf Coast of Texas. It costs between five and six cents a gallon to deliver oil by tank car from Texas to Michigan. The price of fuel oil in Texas has increased rapidly as the shortage has become more acute. Our last three tank cars of light fuel have cost us between 21c and 22c per gallon delivered into Lowell. This is the same oil that we are retailing for 18c

per gallon. Our average margin on fuel oil is much less than the normal jobber margin.

We regret the necessity for present fuel oil prices, and wish to assure all of our customers that we will reduce our prices as soon as we are again able to purchase our oil in the normal channels. We will continue to attempt to buy sufficient fuel oil from Texas and other points to supply all of our regular customers.






