### Health Department Gives Wise Advice For Memorial Day

The very things you enjoy the most may turn out to be the greatest handicaps to your health and even to your life on the long Memorial Day week-end, the Michigan Department of Health warned Michigan folk today.

Drive with care and avoid excesses in eating, drinking, sunning, swimming, fishing, golfing and any other form of exercise, it advised.

Roads will be flooded with traffic. Have your car checked if you plan any driving—brakes, horn, lights, tires, windshield wipers and steering mechanism. Do not plan to drive if you are going to do any drinking. Obey traffic laws and signs and give the other fellow your right-of-way.

Good restaurants will be filled to capacity. Be careful what you take in your picnic baskets. Keep perishables cold. You can bring food poisoning from home as well as get it in an unclean restaurant. Drink only water from a municipal supply and only pasteurized milk.

Take your sunning in short intervals. Remember you can burn under a cloudy sky on a cool day, and you burn more quickly near or on water. Lake water will be cold. Do not swim in swift water. Do not rush headlong or dive into extremely cold water. Do not swim alone or show off. Do not stand up in your small fishing boat. Do not go into a lake when a storm threatens. Remember that a little golfing, softball, swimming or tennis is considerable strain on the heart at the beginning of the season. Ride only a horse you can handle, and fly only with a competent pilot in fully serviced craft.

Memorial Day is a time to remember the dead, not to join them.

### Dowagiac Publisher Has Served 21 Years

When Harry H. Whiteley, Dowagiac publisher and dean of Michigan's conservation commission, resigned from the commission this week he had completed nearly 21 continuous years of service under nine governors. He was chairman of the commission's lands committee in the early days of Michigan's oil and gas development, and for many years he helped shape commission land policies as the state's holdings increased from 850,000 acres in 1927 to the 4,380,000 acres of forest, game and recreational lands the commission administers today.

Governor Sigler's choice to succeed Whiteley on the commission also is a publisher from southwestern Michigan, William A. Butler of Holland.

### Memorial Day

Deeds of gallantry speak for themselves. They become highlights in history and live because they are tied in with our national enthusiasm for honor and integrity, pride in valor, the realized debt of gratitude we owe our nation's heroes.

Memorial Day was established by the Grand Army of the Republic and though the rank of Civil War veterans has passed, the Grand Army posts on longer active, World Wars in which later generations have died, has continued to keep fresh the remembrance of this holiday.

Memorial Day is the soldier's own, for men who be lieved in a principle and died for it. Greater than the men, however, is the thing they died to secure. That thing we call freedom.

As we decorate the graves, place wreaths on monuments, gather to observe ceremonies in public, we are honoring the great and their battle cry of freedom. Today as we meet in tribute we are planning the building of a stronger military strength, naval supremacy and air power. We boast of what we have accomplished in peace, but we expect to safeguard our nation against any future threat by making our force of arms formidable.

Though born of war, Memorial Day speaks for peace. The tribute we pay at this time, is but a gesture lacking in sincerity, if we do not at the same time dedicate ourselves to the cause of peace. We must offer all the facilities of this country to preserve the lives of our young, to protect them from such a sacrifice, that we do not heedlessly mark new graves for decoration on other Memorial Days.

Mothers are the real pacifists. Not that they do not revere our national traditions, our heritage, nor respect the need of fighting to hold freedom. But mothers can't hand their beloved sons to the enemy, can't place a gun in their hands, without crying first for peace.

Mothers are the chief mourners in the military cemeteries. The world needs men who study trade agreements, finance, economics, spheres of influence, to sit at the war council tables, but there is a place at the session for mothers, who know more of the fear and agony of war's demands. The way of the mother is often overcomes by the demands of the monstrous mad war machine.

May we keep our Memorial Day in good faith, in unflinching devotion to its purpose—honor and principle. The dead were victorious if they gain for us universal peace.
