Frank VanDusen Tells of Life In Merchant Marine

Mrs. Maude VanDusen has received an interesting letter from her son, Frank, a sailor in the Merchant Marine, in which he mentions ports he has visited. The following excerpts are taken from Frank's letter. His description of the Panama Canal is especially interesting.

"Dear Mom:
"A year ago today, July 4, I was home and now I am going up the coast of Mexico. Boy time sure does fly.

"It sure is a nice day out here. We are five miles off the coast and the water is as smooth as glass. It is a very pretty sight. We are going by a long and quite high mountain range, which just four days ago we sailed over the top of, by way of the Panama Canal.

"I have been on the ship one month, the 11th of this month and we haven't even started our trip. "After a long trip from Philadelphia we picked up nine passengers at Houston, Texas all of whom are going to China. We were supposed to take on Bunkers there and then to Honolulu but received orders to go to San Pedro, California, where we are due to arrive sometime Thursday morning to Bunker up and by that time I will have covered 6,000 miles and still in the United States.

"So far the trip has been very interesting for me as I have never been in some of these ports and never through the canal.

Remarkable Engineering Feat
"The Panama Canal is some engineering feat. Just imagine raising a ship 90 feet up out of the Caribbean Sea to a man-made lake on the top of a mountain and sailing across 36 miles of fresh water to be dropped 80 feet down into the Pacific Ocean. After you have seen it you can understand why the French gave up. It was too large a job for them.

"With the change of orders we won't be going to Honolulu until we start back home from Mindanao and we won't go to Yokohama at all.

"The passengers have all been sea sick although it hasn't been rough yet. We have a preacher and wife and two children and two women in their forties all of whom are missionaries. Then we have a young couple with a nine month old baby who are going to work in the American Embassy in Hong Kong, China. They don't bother us at all. They stay on their

own deck. I guess Captain Bligh told them to.

Trouble Aboard Ship
"We had trouble with a couple of fellows in Galveston and they demanded to be paid off with transportation back to Philadelphia.

"The Captain refused to pay them and they got me to intercede for them and I got him to pay them off without transportation, which under Union and Coast Guard rules you can do with mutual consent of both parties concerned. Also I pointed out to him that they were no good, only a couple of drunks. The rest of the crew felt the same way and we brought charges against them. They will be fined \$50 each and suspended for 60 days or kicked out. I heard in a round about way that the Captain commended me for my action and said I had a pretty good head on me. At times I can say the same for him.

"The preacher poked his head in the mess hall this morning and looked around. Some of us were playing cards and I guess he was shocked, but it looked like he wanted to hold a service as he had a Bible in his hand. I don't think it would hurt anyone as most men going to sea are religious in one way or another, but it just isn't done on a Merchant's ship.

"Mrs. Addie Daniels asked me if our cargo was a military secret but it isn't. We have general cargo in the lower hold but I don't know what it is and the rest of the holds are filled with bales of cotton, about 15,000. We have a deck cargo of drums of oil, gasoline, wood rosin, and some kind of cleaning fluid.

"That's about all for now.

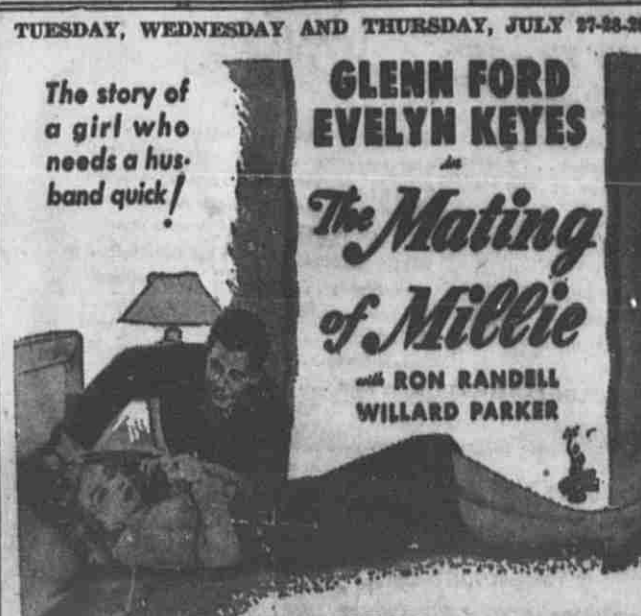
