The Ledger is glad to report, that so far as known, no accidents occurred to mar the long Labor Day week-end in this vicinity.

For the country as a whole it is estimated that the death toll will reach about 400 by the time all reports are in. Traffic mishaps are expected to account for 280 deaths, drowning 30, miscellaneous 44.

Thirteen persons lost their lives on Michigan's highways and six died from drowning.

## Driver Training To Be Continued New Dual-Control Ford Car To Be Delivered to L.H.S. Supt.

Lowell public school will have a brand new dual-control car to begin another year of automobile driver-training this fall. Application for the new Ford car was today approved by both Automobile Club of Michigan and American Automobile Association. Delivery will be made sometime this week to the superintendent of schools in Lowell by Jay Coelen, local Ford manager of the C. H. Runciman Co. Motor Sales.

Lowell's car will be among more than 150 dual-control autos being delivered to Michigan high schools this fall as replacements for cars in use during the 1947-48 school year and 100 other schools still starting the course. Auto Club will again furnish text materials for the course.

"With more than a quarter of the state's public high schools offering the course, Michigan still leads the nation in teaching its youngsters how to drive," Ernest P. Davis, Auto Club safety and traffic director, said. At least 100 more schools are expected to adopt the course this school year.

Driver training is termed by safety men the "most worthwhile safety movement to come along since safety patrol."

"More than 80 percent of all highway accidents and deaths are caused by drivers' errors. Until every school has driver training, accidents will not be materially reduced. Despite the large number of old autos on the roads and Michigan's steadily deteriorating highways, drivers' mistakes cause nearly all accidents. Driver training, not new laws or compulsory motor vehicle inspection, is the only thing that will help much," Davis stated.

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## Governor Proclaims National Guard Day

Marking the eighth anniversary of its order for induction into federal service for World War II, the National Guard will observe September 16, with appropriate community ceremonies. Governor Sigler declared in his proclamation, "The Michigan National Guard is once more an effective instrument for state and national security, just after its reorganization following World War II. With its manpower and equipment the greatest in its history, the new Michigan National Guard is prepared to carry forward the high traditions of the past as it assumes its important role in the nation's first line of defense."

## Lowell High School To Surpass Records

Although accurate figures are not yet available there are indications that the enrollment in Lowell high school will surpass the record of 357.

The membership in the grades will undoubtedly show a decrease because of the restrictions made by the Board of Education. No children outside of the district are accepted except for those from two districts with which the Board has had long term agreements.

All teachers were on hand Tuesday morning at the opening breakfast served by the Board of Education.

The principal changes in the staff are: Miss Laura Johnson, Latin and English; Mrs. E. Wedemeier, art in the grades; Mrs. Bruce Walter, music in the grades; Mrs. Ray Borgerson, Junior high school and Mrs. R. Hahn, librarian.

Mrs. Doyle will teach Spanish, Miss Nelson changes from English to mathematics and Mrs. G. Rivette will be on full time as an assistant in the grades.

10,000,000 People Visit State Parks

Campers have flocked to state parks in 10 per cent greater numbers than in 1947, and total park attendance this year is edging the 10,000,000 mark.

An increase of 3,000 campers and 40,000 to 50,000 in total attendance to date was shown in preliminary reports of the conservation department's parks division.

Last year, 31,500 campers and 9,200,000 park visitors had appeared in state parks up to August 31. This year's tentative figures were taken from partial reports to August 22.

All 47 state parks and 13 recreation areas remained open Labor Day and for an indefinite time afterwards, with some parks to remain open all winter.

10,000 Pedestrians Killed on Highways 220,000 Injured

Ten thousand Americans literally walked themselves to death in 1947, the National Safety Council says.

That was the pedestrian traffic death toll for last year. Since the total traffic death toll in 1947 was 22,800, the figures mean that almost one of every three persons killed in traffic was a pedestrian.

In addition, pedestrian accidents injured 220,000 persons.

"Heads Up—Don't Be Struck Down" is the watchword of a nationwide effort by the Council to emphasize pedestrian hazards this fall as more hours of darkness double the danger.

Deaths Hit Peak in Fall

Pedestrian deaths reach a peak in the late fall, when they are as high as 42 per cent above the monthly average for the whole year.

Why? The Council says the most important single reason for the seasonal jump in pedestrian deaths is darkness. Earlier nightfall, plus the fact that many communities go off daylight saving time, brings the evening rush hour of home-bound workers into the hours of dusk or darkness.

Drivers contribute to the death toll, according to the Council, because they fail to adjust their speed to the gradually changing visibility as days grow shorter. A motorist accustomed throughout the summer to making a trip in 25 minutes still thinks he should maintain that schedule even though he may be driving with his lights on. So he hasn't the same chance of avoiding an unexpected act by a pedestrian that he had in full daylight.

## Up and Down Kent County Roads

The drought and hot weather continue as this column was written on September 2. A few cool days brought a welcome respite. Our office was glad the annual 4-H fair was held the week of the 16th of August.

The weather is seriously affecting crops. Silo fillers are busy two or three weeks earlier than usual and much of the corn going into silage is not in the best condition. The chap who plowed early for wheat is fortunate. Plowing now is a hard dry job. Fruit is affected. Early peaches have been small and the later varieties are apt to be hurt but the eating quality has been excellent. Beans and potatoes will suffer unless rain comes soon.

The fire hazard increases. Between here and Lowell, and the same is true on other roads, we saw three or four burned-over spots, the first having burned to the road's edge which would point to a carelessly dropped match or cigarette. On the Grand Trunk Railroad at Ada there was a burned area indicating a fire from a locomotive.

Don't start grass fires or burn rubbish heaps when it is as dry as it is now.

## Maurice E. Post For State Senator

Maurice E. Post the veteran legislator from Rockford, is candidate for senator from the Seventeenth District only because his friends insisted that the county and state could ill afford to lose his services in the state legislature.

In permitting his name to be tossed into the ring for the seat vacated by the resignation of Harold Saur and later by the untimely death of James Quinlan, Mr. Post stated that if his record as a legislator and citizen did not speak loudly enough in his behalf, then he did not care for the nomination.

The Committee agreed that flood control and drainage projects to provide an outlet for Michigan's vast drainage system through the main stem of our larger rivers cannot possibly be financed entirely from local funds and will require both state and federal aid in many cases. The legislators directed Gale H. Gibson, secretary of the Saginaw Valley Planning Commission and chairman of a committee drafting a flood control bill, to include provision therein for state aid for large flood control and drainage projects. State aid was made possible by a 1944 constitutional amendment.

The Committee also approved in general, the use of Ohio's Conservancy District Act as a model for similar legislation in Michigan, and decided to visit Ohio in October to study its legislation with a view to determining changes necessary to make it applicable to Michigan conditions. Several members of the Committee stated they wanted to know how the law operated in Ohio before presenting a similar bill for consideration by the Michigan Legislature. Chairman Young said the Committee would confer with both farmers and city officials in affected areas as well as directors and engineers of Conservancy Districts and the State Water Resources Board.

The Child City is located 35 miles west of Chicago on a tract of more than 1200 acres situated on the beautiful Fox River in Northern Illinois. The terrific differential between Mooseheart and the average orphanage cannot be better described than through the use of the statement made to the Post by one of Mooseheart's graduates, Russell Rayeroff who, at thirtythree, is an executive of one of the largest radio agencies in the country.

In his statement to the Post, Rayeroff said, "My father died, leaving our mother, my sister, Mary, and myself entirely dependent. We had to go to Mooseheart and none of us wanted to go. To me it was an orphanage and orphanages were red-brick, dismal repulsive places. We walked up the tree-lined avenue to Mooseheart and I dreaded the end of the walk—the usual red-brick building. Suddenly we came into full view of Mooseheart's great expanse—no red-brick buildings but a cognate, bright homes spread out on hundreds of acres of beautiful lawns. I loved Mooseheart from that moment and I will until I die. I've been around, I've made a career, fought in a war and have seen many foreign lands, but I still get homesick for Mooseheart."

Frank L. Keiser, secretary of the local Lodge of Loyal Order of Moose, advised that six new homes at Mooseheart have just been opened for boys and girls ranging from babies in arms to seniors in the Mooseheart high school. The article, "City of Children," written by Warner Olivier, will be of great interest to every parent in this community.

**THE RINGS YOU CAN'T HEAR**—Many improvements in telephone service come about so gradually that it's sometimes easy to overlook the results. Take the matter of ringing on rural lines, for example. Ten years ago, nearly every rural-line telephone customer served by Michigan Bell heard the rings of all other parties on the line. Today 87 out of every 100 hear the rings of no more than half the parties on their line.

**METAL MUNCHER**—Squirrels occasionally gnaw holes in the lead sheathing around telephone cables. To prevent damage from moisture reaching the wires through these and other types of punctures, many cables are kept filled with gas. When the gas escapes, lowered pressure sets off an alarm in the telephone central office. Sensitive devices help tell where the break has occurred and a repairman can go out and clear the trouble, in most cases before service is interrupted.

**DIAL DECADE**—Ten years ago only one-tenth of the telephones on Michigan Bell's rural lines were dial. Today, even though the war years temporarily halted the extension of dial service, nearly two-thirds of the rural-line telephones are dial.
