



The hot lunch department of Lowell schools has been enjoying venison this week. A yearling buck killed by a Chesapeake and Ohio train a mile south of Lowell last Thursday afternoon, was turned over to the school by police officer L. A. Tanner.

The state department has abandoned the practice of making special auto license plates with the names of the state and local governmental agencies on them. Instead, the department will issue a license plate for all governmental agencies with a letter "X" outlined by a diamond and followed by five numerals.

Once an excellent source of the shells from which pearl buttons and mother-of-pearl articles are made, Michigan rivers now yield few commercially valuable shells, a University of Michigan Museum exhibit indicates.

Only the Grand River still produces a good yield of mussel shells, which are the principal raw material of the button industry. Dr. Henry van der Schalle, assistant professor of zoology and curator of mollusks in the Museum, points out that the peak yield from Michigan rivers was reached soon after the first World War. In 1922, five million pounds of shells were gathered from the rivers of the Lower Peninsula and sold as raw material for buttons and similar products. In 1935, the annual yield had dropped to a half million pounds, while today only the Grand River produces a commercial quantity of shells.

This week's best story concerns Gordon Frost who lives on the Vergennes-Gratian townline. The story goes that Gordon had no luck in bagging a buck while hunting in the county, but during his absence a neighbor, Clayton Engle, got his buck on Gordon's farm.

Overlooked in the recent presidential campaign was the fact that two Michigan people ran for the presidency and were defeated just 100 years apart.

Back in 1848, Lewis Cass, Michigan's first governor, was nominated by the Democrats and was defeated by Zachary Taylor. Then in 1948, Michigan-born Thomas E. Dewey went down to defeat in the polls.

## Rheumatic Fever Is Most Serious Takes Lives of More of Our School Children Than Any Other Disease

Rheumatic fever takes the lives of more Michigan school children than any other disease, and its resulting heart damage causes the crippling of multitudes, according to Dr. Albert E. Heustis, State Health Commissioner. The illness is more common in Michigan than most parents suspect.

The disease flourishes in cold, damp weather, under crowded living conditions and among children who do not eat proper food. The disease is not contagious, like measles or mumps, but it often follows the highly contagious streptococcal throat and nose infections.

Cause of the illness is not surely known, but symptoms which should indicate an immediate check-up by the child's physician, especially if the child is under 14 years of age, are: low, unexplained, persistent fever, pain in the muscles and joints, rapid heart beat, repeated nosebleeds without apparent cause, pallor, poor appetite, loss of weight or failure to gain, jerky nervous movements, and frequent sore throat.

**Early Diagnosis Important**  
These signs or symptoms may be so slight that the family doctor has to study the child for months and consult specialists before he is sure. But to protect the life and future health of the child, early diagnosis is of the utmost importance. More than 50,000 Michigan adults are now suffering crippling heart defects from rheumatic fever, and heart disease takes the lives of more Michigan people than any other illness.

Bed rest, perhaps for months, proper diet, prevention of recurrence of the illness, and avoidance of respiratory illness are of the utmost importance to the child of rheumatic fever. Parents should see that the child is properly clothed for winter or cold weather, that he keeps his feet and body dry, that he follows medical instructions, eats the foods he needs, acts as his physician advises, and avoids other children who are ill. He should be taught how to protect his health and the reasons for doing so.

Symptoms listed do not necessarily mean rheumatic fever, but the child ill of rheumatic fever will recover a maximum of health only when his case is diagnosed early and he is given proper care.

**Diagnostic Centers**  
For better diagnosis of rheumatic fever and for consultations, the Michigan State Medical Society in cooperation with the Michigan Society for Crippled Children and Adults and the Michigan Crippled Children Commission has established or is establishing 30 Rheumatic Fever Consultation and Diagnostic Centers in the State, one of which is in Grand Rapids. Admission to these centers is arranged by the family physician who examined the child suspected to have rheumatic fever.

"The militant campaign on the part of the Michigan State Medical Society and other agencies, places the state among the foremost in efforts toward rheumatic fever control," Dr. Heustis said. "The campaign will show its results in a lower death rate and less crippling from rheumatic fever among children and in a decrease in total heart disease in the state."

## Lloyd Kerekes Rests At Home

A memorial prayer service was held at the Roth Chapel at 2:00 o'clock, Wednesday afternoon for Sgt. Lloyd J. Kerekes who gave his life in the service of his country April 9, 1945. The prayer was offered by the Rev. Philip R. Glotfelty, pastor of the Lowell Methodist church with interment in Oakwood cemetery.

The following sketch is reprinted from the Ledger April 26, 1945. Sgt. Kerekes was born in Lowell, May 14, 1921. He attended the Lowell schools, graduating with the class of 1940, after which he attended the United Aircraft Training school at Wichita, Kansas. He then worked for the Stinson Aircraft corporation of Wayne, Mich., until inducted into service May 19, 1942. He received his training with the mountain troops at Camp Hale, Colo., at which time the three Kerekes brothers, Paul, Lloyd and Carl were together. Later they went to Camp Swift, Texas for six months. On January 1, 1945, Lloyd and Carl were sent to Italy, where Lloyd met his death four months later.

A letter from the company chaplain to Mr. and Mrs. Kerekes told how Lloyd died, while caring for his men. The chaplain's letter said it was Lloyd's duty to leave his dugout to check up on the health of his men and to take their rations to them in their fox holes. It was while crawling from one fox hole to another that he was shot by a German sniper.
