Butter Substitutes Always Have Spread Fraud and Deception

The major federal curb on butterlegging has been exercised in the past through the power to tax eleomargarine.

Congress imposes a federal tax of 10 cents a pound on vellow elemargarine. A federal tax of 1/4 of one cent a pound is also imposed upon uncolored eleomargarine to assure that manufacture and sale are properly reported. License fees are required of retailers and wholesalers. The receipts go to the Internal Revenue Department to pay the costs of policing the oleomargarine industry.

This control method dates back to the time of President Grover Cleveland. Following the invention of a French Process "to obtain butter" from beef tallow or oleo fat in 1870, fraud in the sale of this substance became widespread. By 1880 the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey had passed laws against the product to protect the public from racketeers. In 1886 the Congress recognized that control by states was ineffective, and enacted the first eleomargarine act.

"If the existance of the commodity and the profits of its manufacture and sale depend on disposing of it to the people for something else which it deceitfully imitates, the entire enterprise is a fraud and not an industry; and if it cannot endure the exhibition of its real character which will be effected by the inspection. supervision and stamping which this bill directs, the sooner it is destroyed the better, in the interests of

butter unless it was colored yellow by artificial means. A mixture of cottonseed oil and sulphur was used for this purpose. Now a dye must be applied after the product has been bleached to remove unpleasant colors, tastes and odors. It is impossible to make a naturally yellow margarine from domestic cottonseed and soybean oils, according to the Armour Research Foundation of the Illinois Institute






