#### FIFTH CRAMTON GENERATION ON SAME FARM



Robert Cramton, who lives on the Cramton homestead, in the Honey Creek area, northwest of Lowell, is a son in the fifth generation consecutively to operate this fine old farm.

Alanson Cramton purchased this 130-acre piece of land in 1854, and with his wife, who was the former Susan Robinson, a niece of Rix Robinson, moved through the woods with only the log trails for roads, to make their home. It was a very primitive setting and they literally carved their home out of the wilderness, clearing c-way trees and brush as best they were able with the meagre supply of tools with which to work. Down through the years more fields were made tillable and more buildings appeared.

They had one son Charles, who was called to fight in the Civil War and left his wife and two small children to live at the parental home until his return. After about two years he was discharged and started back to home and family. Younger members of the family can still remember hearing grandfathers tell of the surprise meeting in the woods when Charles was tramping along the log trail towards home and met his father going into town (Ada) using the same type of transportation, in that day commonly known as "Shank's horses," and which many of our youth today mention as "hoofing it."

The elder Cramton and his wife then retired to make their home on a smaller farm and Charles and family took over the homestead.

In his turn Jerome, one of Charles' sons became manager of the home farm and his parents retired. He, Rix Robinson, was a successful farmer and took good care of the property, continuing until his son, Charles was old enough to take over. Then Jerome bought a home in Ada and retired. And so it went on, one son after another in each generation worked the home farm and they must truly have been "Sons of the Soil" for each has made good in the agricultural industry.

Now Robert, the latest Cramton farmer to be established on the home farm, with his wife, the former Rosemarie Nichel of Knapp Ave., are making the most of their opportunity to demonstrate a good job of farming. They have a fine herd of Guernseys with about 12 milkers, a nice flock of young turkeys, and are doing diversified farming on this rather large acreage. Both Robert and Rosemarie are interested in the work and it is said she is very efficient in handling the tractor when needed to help about outside work.
