Robert Whitby, who lives on his 90-acre farm on old M-21 just east of the Kent-Ionia county line, is specializing on root crops on his muck land though he also raises grain and other crops on his thirty acres of upland.

Robert was born in Boston township on the former Fred Dillenbeck farm where his father, Otis Whitby, did farming. Robert has always lived on a farm in the same township and knows what to do with his land.

Seven years ago he purchased the farm on which he lives and began to develop the river bottom or muck land and has sixty acres under cultivation growing onions, carrots, cabbage and other vegetables which thrive on this type of soil.

Mr. Whitby does all of the work possible with machinery and the only livestock on the place is young cattle which he pastures.
