



that \$14,500,000 must be raised to meet the national polio bill. During 1948, when there were 27,908 cases in the country, the highest number since the record total in 1916, the National Foun-dation and its Chapters spent funds to provide epidemic serv-ices, he said. With even more cases this year, it looks as though it may cost \$25,000,000 in 1949 to naw for that, part of medical
