**Kent Ag. Topics**  
Notes from Kent County Extension Office by Richard Maschke  
Are you situated like most home owners in that your lawn is peppered with crab grass? That's the grass that thrives on the most fertile soil. Seems like many folks have thought this year. Here's what to do—take out all the grass you can and burn it to destroy the seed. Next spring reseed the thin areas in the lawn and fertilize the entire lawn with a good fertilizer such as 16-4-4. If you keep your grass mowed in good shape you won't have near as much trouble next year.
