A New Vitamin "Z"—For Zest Is Found in Michigan Apples

There's a new vitamin—"Z"—for zest—in Michigan apples, the Michigan Department of Health announced today. They enrich a luscious, crisp, appetizing, and healthy apple with a substance called Vitamin Z. The vitamin is found in the skin of the apple and is most abundant in the core. It is a fat-soluble vitamin and is destroyed by heat and light. It is essential for the growth and development of the body and is especially important for children and the elderly. Apples are a good source of Vitamin Z and should be eaten frequently.

Try New Apple Dishes

Try the time-tested apple pie, apple sauce, baked apples, apple dumplings, brown betty and Waldorf salad, but try some new apple dishes this year, as well. Chop apples and cabbage; apples, peaches and marshmallows; or apples with raisins, carrots, celery, coconut or other nuts, for salads. Make apple pan dowdy, apple crunch, apple roll (like jelly roll), deep-dish apple pie, applesauce cake, apple oatmeal cake, apple sauce (with cinnamon candies), apple-raisin, apple-prune or apple-cranberry pie, for dessert. Make butter-soaked apples by using brown sugar syrup thickened and with butter added, poured over warm stewed apples, or spiced apple snow.
