EGG SHELLS NEED CALCIUM Since an egg shell is largely calcium carbonate, hens must have plenty of this mineral.

One of her sources of calcium is the feed which she receives each day. The other is the calcium that is present in her bones.

Hens get a big part of their calcium from the laying mash, but a hopper of oyster shells or other calcium carrying material should be kept before the hen so she will be sure of an adequate supply.

Lake-Circled Michigan Cited as Refuge From Hay Fever by Wayne U. Medicos

Wayne U. Medicos, a physician from Grand Rapids, Michigan, has issued a warning to hay fever sufferers that Michigan's Lake Superior basin is a natural refuge from the disease.



A stretch of sandy Lake Huron beach between Chebeyan and Alpena is one of many Michigan areas found to enjoy an atmosphere soothing to hay fever-sufferers.

With its three thousand miles of coastline along four of the Great Lakes, Michigan has extensive water-bordered areas which provide refuge from hay fever, the most common of the chief irritants connected with hay fever.

Barrenness of regions along the state's shores has brought special comment from two research workers at the Wayne University College of Medicine, in Detroit, who said that one bit of Michigan, the Boy's camp area, has a large area of beachland which is free of the plant.

Dr. Alex and Sidney Friedlander, has shown that although ragweed is plentiful in the southern part of the state, the two peninsulas have large areas of beachland which are free of the plant. Throughout the central and northern part of the state, lakeland air is free of the pollen except on days when there are strong southerly winds from inland regions.

The doctors, who are engaged in one phase of a nation-wide study, say that two factors give Michigan's beach areas their protective role. First, air loses its pollen in blowing over expanse of water. Second, wide stretches of beach sand, unlike cultivated fields or brushlands, repeat growth of the plant.

Several special programs have been arranged for the dedication, and open house will be observed throughout the week in the new studios of WUOM on the fifth floor of the Administration Building.

PINE SEEDLINGS AVAILABLE FOR SPRING PLANTING TIME Farmers and other planning reforestation work in the spring planting season now can place orders for stock with the conservation department's forestry division office in Lansing.

Stock available, red and jack pine seedlings and white pine transplants, is distributed at cost for reforestation and may not be resold or otherwise used commercially. Stock must be ordered on special blanks provided by the forestry division, on which the legal description of the acreage to be planted appears.

Prices are \$3 a thousand for two-year-old red pine seedlings and \$4 a thousand for three-year-old white pine transplants. Close to 7,000,000 seedlings and transplants were distributed to farmers, industries, schools and communities last year.

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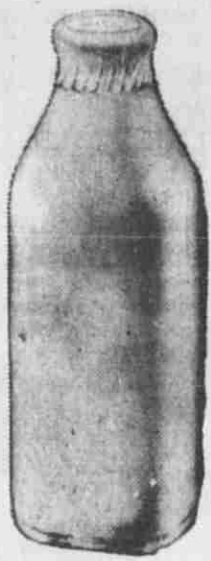

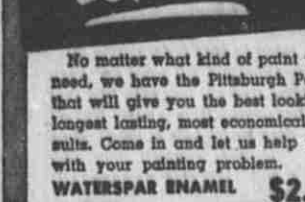
