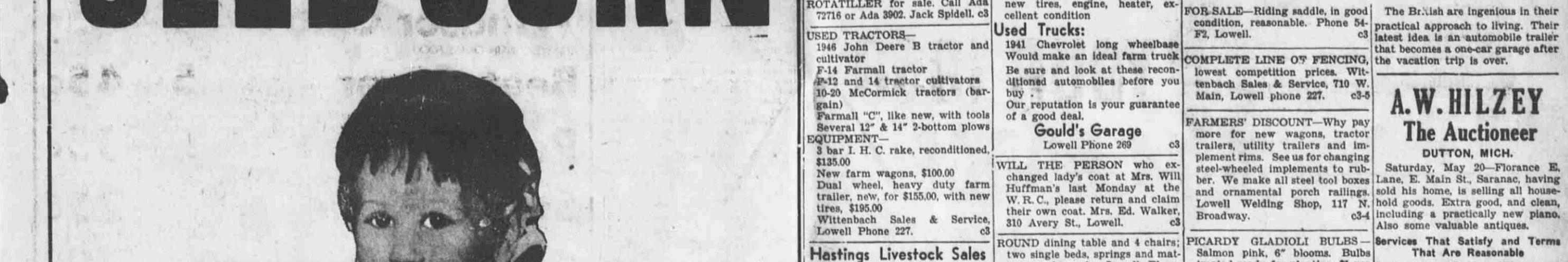

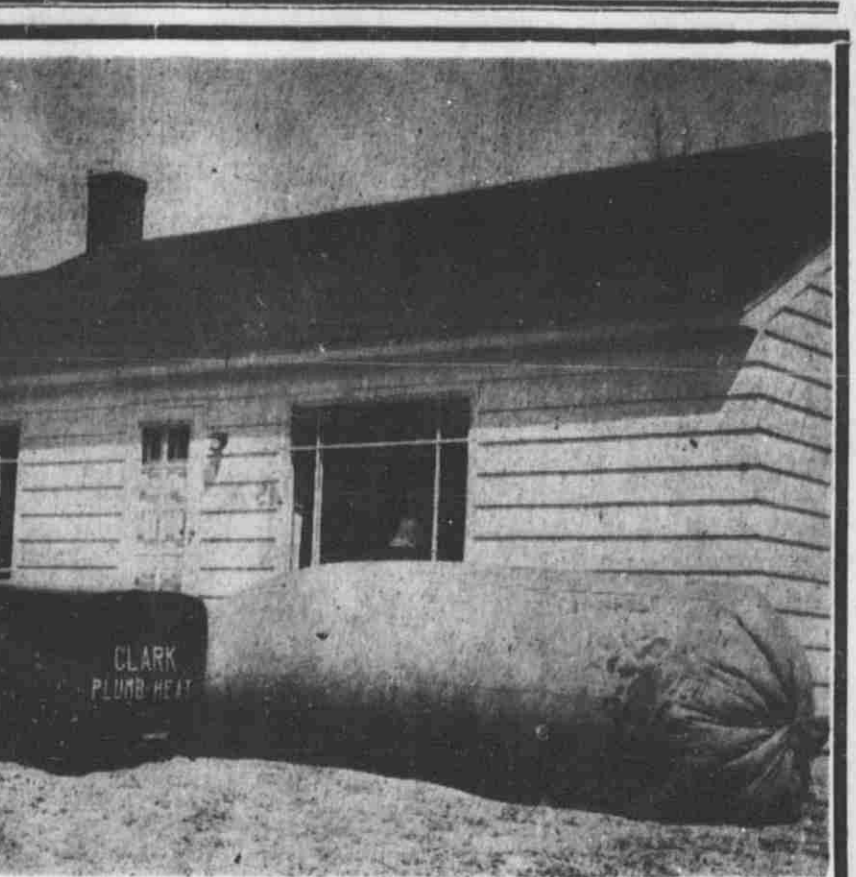

 Note from Kent County Extension Office by Richard Macheels
 Agriculture
 The Macheels family will be on their way this week for a three month leave of absence to do some work in Alberta, Canada. We don't know exactly what lies in store for us in this field, but feel it certainly will be a worthwhile venture. Carl Hanson will be doing the agricultural extension work during our absence.  Have you considered pasture for your horses. It certainly pays dividends. In this way you can help cut down feed costs considerably. A good alfalfa-brome will produce a lot of feed for hogs, lambs, too. It's a good possibility. You'll probably want to use lambs in an alfalfa-brome mixture.
 Thinking about grass silage? If you want to use a preservative, use either dry or liquid molasses per ton or 200 to 250 lbs. of corn or cob meal. Corn meal may be easier to use than molasses and does the job just as well.
 Words come from Jim Hayes of the dairy department, that Sudan grass used for pasture can be seeded if the ground is fertile enough, moisture is normal and not less than two bushels per acre are pastured during the season.
 You can seed with alfalfa, 6 to 8 lbs. an acre home 2 to 4 lbs.
 This practice will cut down the high cost of Sudan used for pasture alone.

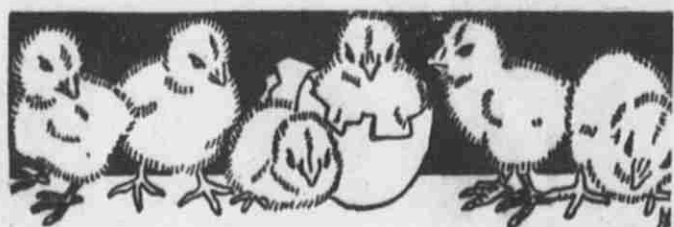
