### Grain Is Valuable Harvesting Methods Storage Important

We are about to enter the grain harvesting season. Millions of dollars are at stake. Part of that income will be lost by poor harvesting methods and carelessness in grain storage and the grain grower will be the financial loser. By following a few simple steps dollars and time can be saved.

Harvesting must not be rushed. Grain with over a 14% moisture content, is not marketable because it is unsafe for storage. For protection on the most millers and elevators provide a moisture tester. A simple moisture test on grain, which is available without cost, answers the question of whether the grain is ready to harvest. A one quart sample is sufficient for a test.

The time to cut the grain is very important. Combining should be done in the middle of the day. Not too early in the morning and not too late in the afternoon.

Grain bins should be readied before harvesting. They should be cleaned and fumigated to insure against insect infested wheat later on. A grain buyer cannot buy buggy grain any more than he can buy grain with a high moisture content. Your grain buyer can recommend or supply you with reliable fumigants which are supplied at nominal costs, usually more economically in bulk if a container is furnished.

Carelessness in the harvesting of grain means a financial loss. A little precaution means extra dollars to the grain growers. High quality grain commands top market prices.

Milton D. Rogers, 39, passed away unexpectedly Saturday morning following a heart attack. He had been in the usual good health and was at his work in Grand Rapids on Friday. On arising Saturday he called to his sister with whom he made his home and asked for a doctor and then collapsed and was gone instantly, before a doctor could reach him.

Dee, as he was better known here was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Leon Rogers, and spent most of his life in Lowell and attended Lowell schools. He was a veteran of World War II and saw service in both the European and African Theatres of War and has suffered from malaria since his return home.

Mr. Rogers was a member of the American Legion, the Moose, and was a charter member and one of the veterans who helped to form the local post Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was first of the returned World War II veterans to be taken by death.

Surviving are one brother, George of Lowell; and two sisters, Mrs. Helen Barnett, of Lowell, and Mrs. Anna Gates, of Grand Rapids.

Funeral services were held at the Roth Funeral Home Monday afternoon under the auspices of the American Legion, and burial was made in Oakwood cemetery. The Rev. Philip R. Glotfelty officiated.

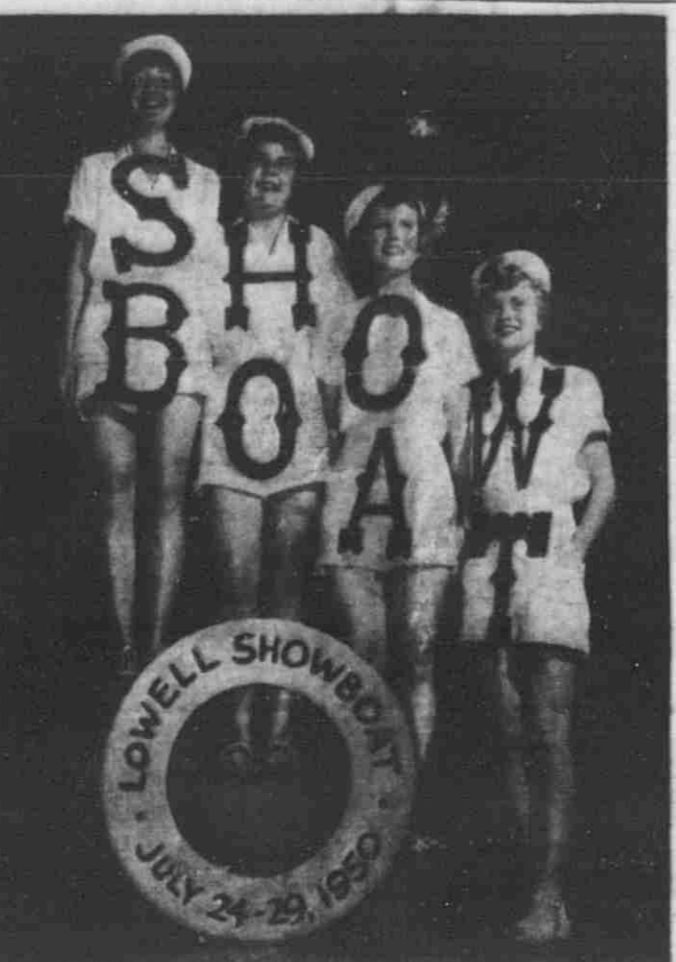
A short business session followed and the Showboat tickets for Tuesday night, July 25, which is Business and Professional Women's special night, were sold.

### Provisions of New Draft Law

Highlights of the draft law which President put into operation Friday:

Any male, with certain exceptions, who has reached his 19th birthday and has not yet reached his 26th, can be ordered into uniform and kept in service for 21 months.

Any member of the National Guard or the Reserves can be called into active service for the same length of time.

The 1948 draft law did not permit the activation of Reserves and National Guardsmen, but Congress gave that power to the President when it recently extended the law until July 9, 1951.

Every male must register with his local draft board as soon as he becomes 18. He can't be drafted for a year after that.

Exempted groups include ministers and ministerial students, aliens who have not applied for citizenship, mentally, morally or physically unfit persons, state and federal judges, Congressmen and members of state legislatures, and other officials elected by statewide vote, conscientious objectors, sole surviving sons of families who have already lost a member in military service, and war veterans who served at least 90 days between Dec. 7, 1941, and Sept. 12, 1945, or at least 12 months between Sept. 16, 1945 and June 24, 1948.

Local draft boards may grant deferments to others, such as men who have dependents or who are engaged in essential work, but these deferments can be revoked.

### Senate Committee Recommends Revising Entire Welfare System

Easy credit and installment buying are proving to be pitfalls into public welfare relief. It is one of the principle causes of financial trouble which bring people into Michigan relief work.

Howard Despolder, welfare director for Montcalm county, gave this interesting bit of information recently to newspaper editors of Montcalm county at Lakeview. It illustrates the many complications of modern living whereby sales promotion of retailers prompt some families to go into debt greater than their income. Since installment payments on these heavy debts leave nothing for living expenses, the families then apply for relief at the expense of the taxpayers.

The Montcalm welfare director blamed merchants for the unusual situation, and he appealed to retailers not to sell people things they could not pay for. Tightening of credit and installment buying privileges would result in less welfare relief, according to the Montcalm welfare director.

The cost of relief in this county in 1941 was \$12,371. Eight years later (1949) welfare costs rose to \$58,322. Since the year 1941 was one of general prosperity, city and farm residence alike good times, the question naturally arises as to why welfare costs have mounted so substantially, more than 400 per cent in the eight-year interim.

Editor's Note—Kent and other counties are comparable in figures according to population.

Kent county welfare has increased gradually during the past few years until the load of \$88,781 in 1945 has risen to \$291,514 in 1949. Welfare Director Ira M. Dean reports that during the first half of 1950 \$166,782 have been paid out for welfare. At present there are no employables on the relief rolls states Mr. Dean. However, there was some temporary relief granted during the winter months.

Mr. Dean states there are 5,029 old age assistance cases receiving an average grant of \$48.33, a total of \$261,094 per month. Receiving Aid to Dependent Children are 744 a total of \$61,370 per month, in addition to the other types of welfare benefits.

The rising cost of welfare in Michigan prompted an investigation by a committee of the Michigan state legislature in 1949. Collins L. Smith, Republican of Big Rapids, was chairman of the special senate committee.

The committee recommended that the entire welfare system be drastically revised and that restrictions should be placed on county welfare departments in the interest of efficiency and economy.

In his call for the 1950 Special Session Governor G. Mennen Williams recommended that the

Legislature impose penalties on welfare chiselers. This recommendation was also made by the special senate committee, and one of the 1950 legislative enactments calls for severe penalties on any welfare officer who aids and abets the welfare chiseler. This act imposes the responsibility to keep the welfare official informed if there is any change in his family income. Heretofore a family could continue to receive welfare aid after the breadwinner obtained employment and the practical need for aid had ceased.

Four other bills were adopted by the legislature although Attorney General Stephen J. Roth held that the bills were not germane to the Governor's Special Session call. These bills would require approval by the State Administrative Board before the Social Welfare Commission could pay more than 50 per cent of any county's relief cost. The measure also prohibited county welfare boards from granting welfare until after an investigation had been made of the applicant's employment, marital and general economic status.

The state's total welfare program involved \$100,000,000 in the fiscal year just ended. The Social Welfare Commission asked for \$114 million for the new fiscal year (starting July 1, 1950).

W. J. Maxey, state social welfare director, reports that "considerably more than half of all welfare costs relate to illness or unemployability of the applicant."

During World War II industry would hire workers who were more than 70 years old. Also women who are involved in aid to dependent children cases were hired by industries during the War and also were the first to be fired when the labor market became competitive.

Maxey hopes the Federal Old Age Insurance system, now being liberalized by Congress, and the growing pension plans of industry will combine to reduce Michigan's \$100 million a year welfare costs.

### Kent County Wheat 1950 Loan Rate Is Somewhat Higher

A basic loan rate for 1950 crop wheat produced in Kent County of \$2.06 per bushel was announced this week by the Production and Marketing Administration county committee. Last year's rate was \$2.02 per bushel.

The basic rate applies to wheat grading U. S. No. 1. Mr. McCabe, committee chairman, points out. Wheat produced on farms cooperating in the 1950 wheat acreage allotment program grading No. 3 or better, or No. 4 or No. 5 because of test weight or because it contains wheat of the classes durum and/or red durum, will be eligible for Commodity Credit Corporation loan or purchase agreement. The chairman says that a schedule of premiums and discounts for the various qualities of 1950 crop wheat will be issued at an early date and will be available for inspection at the county PMA office in Grand Rapids, 207 Spencer St., N. E.

To be eligible for the loan, wheat must be placed in approved storage either on the farm or in a commercial warehouse or elevator, according to the chairman. He points out further that storage allowances will be continued for 1950 crop wheat on the same general basis as last year.

John McCabe explains that the county rate is based on a national average rate of \$1.99 a bushel to farmers as announced by PMA on June 30. The equivalent national average rate for U. S. No. 1 wheat is \$2.00 per bushel.

### Advices Preserving Current Pea Crop

Local crops of fresh peas are available now for table use and for preserving for next winter for your family's enjoyment then.

You can preserve their flavor by canning or freezing if you use correct modern methods advises Roberta Hershey, extension foods specialist at Michigan State College.

If you are canning peas, cover the shelled and washed peas with boiling water and then bring them to a boil. Pack the hot peas in glass jars but be sure to leave one inch of space at the top of the jar as you cover the peas with the boiling water.

Add one-half teaspoon salt to pints and one teaspoon salt to quarts. Adjust the jar lids and process in a pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure for 40 minutes for pints or 45 minutes for quarts. If three or four pints are to be processed in a pressure saucepan, rather than in a pressure canner, they should be processed for 80 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. Pressure saucepans should be equipped with a pressure control device. As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if they are not self-sealing.

It is important to use a recommended variety of peas as some may not freeze well. Thomas Laxton, Onida, and Shasta varieties are suitable for freezing. Avoid over-ripe or immature peas and handle quickly from time of harvest to freezing to preserve quality and flavor.

Peas should be blanched before packaging for freezing. Place enough for one package in a square of cheesecloth. Blanch in one gallon of boiling water for one and one-half minutes. Cool immediately in running water or in ice water. Pack in moisture-vapor-proof bags leaving space for expansion. Quick freeze immediately.
