During the past two months traffic fatalities have been reduced 32 per cent and traffic injuries have dropped nearly 16 per cent. In the same period, 729 drivers have gone to jail for a total of 8,050 days.

The judges and traffic experts believe that the full effect of the new policy is just beginning to be felt, "because it takes from six to eight weeks before the impact of a new program strikes home."

In April, the month before the policy was in effect, 21 persons were killed. This dropped to 12 in May. It is interesting to note that in analyzing the 422 drivers sent to jail in the first month, the Traffic Safety association discovered that 76 per cent of the violators were under 30 years of age.

High moisture grain (above 14% moisture content), in storage, increases the likelihood of infestation with insects, damage from mold growth resulting in musty or sour grain and excessive heating and bin burning. Good bins should provide means of ventilating or turning and fumigating grain.

Moisture Is Added to **Grain by Combining**

In combining wheat, the moisture can be held down by raising the cutter bar to cut above as much green material as possible.

Do not combine grain too early in the morning or too late in the afternon. Keep the grain as cool as possible—less likely to get out of condition. Store your grain in bins that have been cleaned and fumigated.
