

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

Public Buys Sugar and Ignores Chance To Stock Up on COAL

It is characteristic of the American people that at the first hint of military or economic upset they stampede to buy sugar, coffee, tires and automobiles -the very commodities on which there appears to be the least danger of any acute shortage.

However, they wholly refuse to evince any interest in laying in an adequate supply of the one comodity that is most necessary and most susceptible

Total production of bituminous coal in this nation from January 1 to July 1 was only 220,000,000 tons. This is at the annual rate of 450,000,000 tons. Considering the fact that the year started with a tremendous coal strike which reduced existing stocks to a point at least 40,000,000 tons below normal, these production figures look puny.

The inescapable corollary is either one of two things is going to happen: either coal is going to move at a much more rapid pace in the immediate future, or we will again hear the old familiar cry of shortage long before the end of the year.

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
