Great Preparation For Flower Show September 7 to 9

Final plans are being made this week for the Showboat Garden Club Flower Show to be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Sept. 7, 8, and 9, in the Lowell City Hall.

A special feature will be the "Walk Talk" to be given by Mrs. Orva Chadwick of Grand Rapids who will judge the exhibits. Her talk will be given at eight o'clock on Thursday evening when the Show opens.

Tea will be served on Friday and Saturday afternoons between two and four o'clock with Mrs. Gerald Roth and her committee in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Gould Rivette, chairman of classifications and awards, announces the following rules and schedule of classifications:

- Rules**
1. All entries must be made between 12:00 and 2:00 p. m. Thursday, Sept. 7, and may be called for after 7:00 on Saturday p. m. All entries must be called for before 9:00. Important—Do not bring in exhibits at the last minute and expect to arrange them. Books will close promptly at two o'clock.
 2. This flower show is open to amateurs only.
 3. All specimen cut flowers must be grown by exhibitor.
 4. Limit of five entries by one person in Sections I to VI inclusive.
- Awards, First prizes, 50c in Specimen Section I, Sections II, IV, V, and VI, \$1.00. Section III, \$3.00. Ribbons given to all 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners.

FLOWER CLASSIFICATIONS

Section I. Specimen Cut Flowers:

This section to be judged on the quality of the flower and foliage.

Petunias: (4 stems, preferably only 3 blooms). Class 1-purple; Class 2-red; Class 3-orange; Class 4-white; Class 5-variegated; Class 6-fringed.

Zinnias (3 blooms): Class 7-large giant flowering; Class 8-medium-sized flowering; Class 9-small flowering; Class 10-Mexican flowering; Class 11-fantasy.

Marginals (3 blooms): Class 12-French; Class 13-Chrysanthemum flowering; Class 14-large African; Class 15-Snapdragons (1 or 3 blooms); Class 16-Cosmos (3 stems); Class 17-Calendaria (3 blooms); Class 18-Gladioli (1 or 3 spikes). Each color must be judged separately. Class 19-Asters (3 blooms). Each color will be judged separately. Class 20-Gaillardia (3 blooms). Each color will be judged separately. Class 21-Rose (1 bloom, 1 color); Class 22-Nasturtium (3 blooms, 1 color); Class 23-Best 3 blooms of any annual or perennial not otherwise classified.

Section II-Artistic Arrangements:

Class 24-Arrangement of Petunias (our Showboat flower); Class 25-Arrangement of Zinnias (large flowering); Class 26-Arrangement of Zinnias (small flowering); Class 27-Arrangement of Marginals; Class 28-Arrangement of Roses; Class 30-Arrangement of Gladioli (preferably low container); Class 31-Interpretive arrangement of holidays, children's birthdays, game table, sports dinner, any special occasions (Accessories permitted); Class 32-Arrangement in green and white, white flowers with foliage in green or white container; Class 33-Flowers and container in shades and tints of yellow to bronze with foliage; Class 34-Flowers and container in shades and tints of pink and lavender with foliage; Class 35-Flowers in shades of red, color of container optional; Class 36-Arrangement using only weeds; Class 37-Men only. Any flower container. Accessories permitted. Class 38-Floor arrangement in large basket or vase; Class 39-Arrangement of wild flowers; Class 40-Arrangement of annuals (flowers and foliage); Class 41-Arrangement of perennials (flowers and foliage); Class 42-Best arrangement of any cultivated flower (can be combination of annuals and perennials); Class 43-Arrangement of fruits and/or vegetables (flowers may be used as accents).

Section III-Table Setting:

Class 44-Picnic table setting, floral arrangement, 1 place setting. Place silver omitted, accessories permitted. Furnish own card table. Open to clubs only; Class 45-Coffee table arrangements.

Section IV-Miniatures:

(Accessories to scale permitted) Class 46-3 inch container and flowers not to exceed 3 inches in any dimension; Class 47-6 inch container and flowers not to exceed 6 inches in any dimension; Class 48-Thimble arrangement (container a thimble; flowers and container not to exceed 4 inches in any dimension).

Section V House Plants:

Class 49-Ivy; Class 50-Fern; Class 51-other foliage; Class 52-African Violet (each color judged separately) Class 53-Begonia; Class 54-Geranium; Class 55-other flowering.

Section VI Junior Exhibits:

Children age 10 or under; Class 56-Best arrangement of flowers; Class 57-Dish garden (5 or more plants); Class 58-Cactus or other small houseplant in small container suitable for window shelf. Age 11 to 17-Class 59-Arrangement of any flower; Class 60-Dish gardens (5 or more plants). Children up to 17 Class-61-Arrangement of weeds and/or wild flowers.

Get Out The Vote Regardless of Party Stressed By Alger

Fred M. Alger, candidate for the republican nomination for governor, was given a cordial reception at the Lowell City Hall this week Monday. In his address to the group assembled to hear him, Mr. Alger said: "It is vital at this time to express as a free people, who our leaders should be in our government. At least go out and get your friends and neighbors to vote so that we may know what the people want."

"Two years ago only 19 per cent of the electors voted at the primary election," Mr. Alger reminded. "We realize that the American form of government is not truly representative when so small a percentage of voters go to the polls."

No New Local Taxes

Constantly increasing Federal taxes to fight World War Two and a Half in Korea, plus increased expenditures for other needs in national defense, make it imperative that State governments operate more efficiently and without new local taxes.

"Seventy percent of all our tax money goes to the federal government leaving only thirty percent to be divided between State and local units. We simply cannot provide the services with such a small allocation of the tax funds," Mr. Alger asserts, "and we cannot afford to overtax people any longer."

In conclusion Mr. Alger said: "I believe that to be truly American today one has to be a liberal. To save the country we must get out the vote this fall regardless of party or the candidate for whom you are voting."
