This new fabric makes you feel as warm as you would in mink because it keeps the tarmth from the body in while in the past wool fabrics and bulky furs wereused for warmth because they would keep the cold out. When wearing this new fabric you quickly reach the warm comfortable stage and stay that way without becoming too warm.

Putting the metal in a fabric adds only a few dollars to the cost of the garment and it is porous enough to be cool in the summer as well as warm in the winter. The process can make a piece of rayon twill coat lining warmer than a much heavier piece of wool material. Fabric thus treated can be washed or dry cleaned. Watch for this new fabric in coat linings this fall and later in drapery linings, bed covers and clothing. It will be ideal for construction workers, traffic cops and soldiers who have to work outside







## King's Nut Doughnuts

2 cups sifted enriched KING's 3/4 teaspon salt 2 tablespoons shortening flour

3 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

l egg

1/2 teaspoon allspice 1/4 teaspoon ginger

1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts

Sift together flour, baking powder, spices and salt. Cream together shortening and sugar. Add egg and beat until light and fluffy. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Gently stir in nuts. Chill I hour or Inger. Roll out on well floured board or pastry cloth about 1/2 inch thick. Cut with floured doughnut cutter. Fry in hot fat (375° F.). As soon as doughnuts rise to top of fat, turn. Turn frequently until doughnuts are golden brown. Dust with confectioners' sugar or granulated sugar while still warm or frost with confectioner's sugar icing when cool. Makes about 2 dozen doughnuts and 2 dozen "holes".




