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Rotary Club Speaker Advises Vote NO on Yellow Oleo Proposal

Lee Lampkin, in addressing the Lowell Rotary Club last week Wednesday on the colored oleo proposal, brought out the following points: "Michigan's 122,000 dairy farms give support and employment to about 600,000 persons, who buy virtually all their needs—their commodities—from Michigan merchants and dealers. They spend the bulk of their \$185,000,000 annual income right here with us. Everybody benefits. The Michigan dairy industry on the farms alone has an investment of \$2,375,000,000. This is an aggregate investment in Michigan alone equal to twice the investment of Ford Motor Company throughout the whole world.

"The oleo industry has grown too, but the greatest producer of oleo today is an alien corporation. It is British. It markets 45% of the nation's oleo and takes its money out of Michigan and the United States. Michigan has one small oleo factory. Vegetable fats are raised principally in the cotton south and midwest, not in Michigan.

"The sole issue is the question of color—yellow," said Mr. Lampkin. That is the natural color of butter. Why does the oleo maker battle so hard to use that natural butter color? What other reason can there be except that the oleo maker wants to make all of us believe that his product is better.

"If we should misguidedly approve the yellow oleo proposal on November 7, we will be reaching into our pockets for money to send outside our state. We will be voting to make even more widespread the deception practiced today. We will take a chance on paying more for oleo if we buy it—because white oleo, the cheapest variety, will be sure to disappear from our markets. The only way we can win is to vote 'NO' on the yellow oleo proposal."
