Former Bowne Folics Notes from Kent County Extension Clara M. Brandebury

If stored on a concrete floor, a
wood platform four to six inches
high will allow air to circulate beneath the bags and prevent caking.

A lot of the corn being harvested is still rather wet. It will pay to keep close watch on it to be sure it doesn't heat or mold. You can increase the air circulation by placing some boards or poles leaning against the side with the other end near the center of the crib. As the corn settles this will leave an air channel under the pole.

Sort out the softer ears and feed them up right away. This soft corp makes good feed, but it does take some special care to keep it from spoiling.
