A total of 58 counties will receive payments from the \$200,000 snow tax money this year for snow removal as compared with 33 last year, reports State Highway Commissioner, Charles M. Ziegler.

Under the state law the snow funds are paid to counties having 60 or more inches of snowfall in one year. Kent county participates in the snow removal money in the amount of \$3,692.46.

Over 200 Killed In Devastating Storm Ohio Suffers Most

One of the worst storms in this country's history which seemed to originate in the Canadian north-west swooped down across the states and closed in on the Atlantic seaboard last Friday and extended well into the south making an all-time record of lows throughout the country for this season of the year.

The coldest spot in Michigan was said to be Cadillac on Friday morning when the temperature was recorded at ten degrees below zero.

There was heavy snowfall ranging from four to twenty-two inches in various localities in Michigan. More than 200 lives were lost as a result of the storm and many millions of dollars damage was done to property.

Cleveland, Ohio, suffered a terrific blizzard Saturday night and Sunday which paralyzed the city. Other parts of Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York states were hard hit, the snow and cold paralyzing industry and traffic in many of the eastern cities where emergency measures had to be taken.

The storm was so general over the United States that few areas were not badly damaged by the wintry blasts and heavy snows. Only California was free from the cold wave and residents had normal summer heat.

State police report roads in Kent county are plowed out and all trunk lines were cleared of snow Monday, though they were slippery in many places and slow driving was necessary to relieve hazardous conditions. School buses and other rural traffic were not able to make their complete scheduled trips Monday.

In the football game at Columbus last Saturday Michigan snowballed her way to the Rose Bowl by defeating Ohio State 9 to 3.
