Price Of Oleo Takes Big Jump During the election campaign last autumn the Butter Industry told consumers that removal of regulations prohibiting the sale of pre-colored yellow butter substitutes would mean a higher selling price for these products, which low-income families claimed they wanted. Fred Walker, secretary-manager of Dairyland Cooperative Creamery Co., at Carson City and spokesman for the dairy industry in central Michigan, states that in the five month period of June through November of 1950, showed all foods up 5.3 percent, with butter going up 7.3 percent. However, uncolored oleo was up 16.3 percent in the states where its sale is allowed.

Mr. Walker pointed out that the increase in the price of oleo over butter has more than doubled.

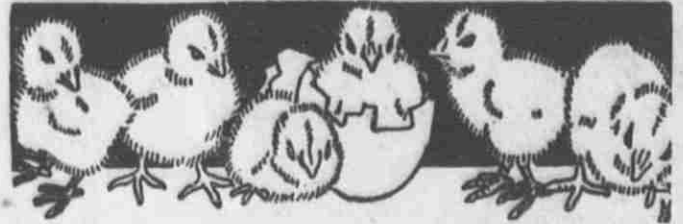

Agriculture
 We are trying to make up a mailing list of strawberry growers for Kent County. From time to time there will be some important information to be sent out and we would like all growers to receive it. Will you send in your name so it can be added to the list?

A few weeks ago we wrote in this column about the 4-H and F. F. A. calf sale to be held at Lowell on April 21. Due to conflicts of state breed sales, it has been necessary to postpone the sale until May 12. 4-H and F. F. A. members be sure to mark this date on your calendar.

If you are interested in producing soybeans you may want to try the new Blackhawk variety. This soybean is adapted to areas where Earlyana is grown. It will outyield Earlyana slightly.

4-H News
 This time of year 4-H club work consists of both winter and summer club work. Winter clubs are having local achievement banquets to celebrate their successful year and pass out pins and certificates. Summer clubs are getting the old gang back together again for summer project work. We would like to see all clubs take care of these activities this month.

The teachers' conservation committee has completed plans for next year's school conservation project. A very complete activity has been developed on soil and water conservation. Rural teachers and students should be interested in this basic conservation study.

Home Economics
 Home economists and farmers are always looking for new ways to get people to drink more milk. Their point of view maybe somewhat different but the result is the same. In New York state they are doing something about it.

Vending machines that offer a cold drink of whole milk, plain or chocolate flavored, at the drop of a coin are being tried out in buildings on the Cornell University campus. Dietary surveys show that calcium is one of the nutrients most likely to be short in the average diet. Milk is one of the best foods for calcium, yet milk drinking has been on the decline since 1945.

All the machines under sales test at Cornell offers milk in half-pint cartons. Several thousand cartons weekly are sold, with chocolate-flavored milk preferred, more than three to one. Butter-milk and coffee-flavored milk were tried but did not prove popular. The sales indicate that much of the milk purchased from machines is in addition to that in the regular diet. Heavy sales come at times other than the lunch hour, especially between eight and ten in the morning.

From School to School

By Lynn H. Clark
 County Supt. of Schools

The teachers institute at Rockford on Friday, March 23, was very successful if the comments of teachers can be taken as an indication. Dr. Richard Struma, Czechoslovakian physician and industrialist, gave a clear picture of the dangers of Communism, and showed a faith in the future of America and free government that should be carried back to every child in Kent County.

East Grand Rapids has done it again! By a wide margin a 7 1/2 mill levy was voted for a period of 15 years to provide an \$860,000 bond issue for buildings.

When the 15 mill limit was adopted by Michigan in 1932 East Grand Rapids was the first district in the state to vote from under the restriction; by 60 mills which is the greatest margin which the amendment allows.

Each five years since the limit has been raised, but in recent years by only 25 mills, as the 50 mill increase would make it impossible for East Grand Rapids City, Grand Rapids Township, or Kent County to raise extra millage.

Budget blanks have been mailed to each district in the county to be returned to the county superintendent's office as soon as possible. The allocation board which divides the 15 mills between county, schools, and townships used to meet in May but now meets in April. As a result, assessment, board of review, and equalization have all been set a month earlier.

The county superintendent of schools is an ex officio member of the allocation board and I can assure you that it is one of the most thankless and undesirable of my responsibilities. Practically no one is ever completely satisfied and the tendency is to blame the individual members even though 15 mills cannot be stretched. The fact that Grand Rapids has just voted a 2 mill increase should relieve the pressure somewhat.

I was quite surprised to learn that Carl Hessler was not a candidate for supervisor of Courtland Township. Sixteen years ago the Education Committee of the Board of Supervisors was formed and Carl has been a member and chairman for those sixteen years. During that time the rural schools of Kent County have made unusual progress and much of it can be credited to the fine support of Mr. Hessler and the Education Committee.
