2 cups sifted King's Enriched

2 cups sugar I teaspoon salt

11/2 teaspoons soda 1/2 teaspoon baking powder I teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon mace

I teaspoon vanilla extract

Sift together flour, sugar, salt, soda, baking powder, cinnamon and mace. Add boiling water to chocolate and cool. Add shortening, 1/2 cup milk and cooled chocolate mixture to dry ingredients. Beat 2 minutes. Add eggs, remaining milk and vanilla extract. Beat 2 minutes more. Pour into 2 greased paper-lined 9inch layer pans. Bake in moderate oven (350°F) 40 min. When cool frost with Quick Pepper mint Frosting. Makes 2 9-in. layers.


