





DETROIT—On an average day, at least one out of every three adults in the United States uses about 50 per cent. Passenger car registrations for 1950 totaled 40, 167,000 compared with 27,372,397 in 1940. at least one out of every three adults in the United States uses a passenger automobile for some essential purpose such as riding to work, conducting business or going shopping.
