Ionia Fair To
Open August 6
With a Parade

The Ionia Free Fair, Michigan's Greatest Outdoor Event, will open at 10:00 a. m., Monday, August 6, with the Third Annual Free Fair Parade.

The hour-long procession of bands, floats, antique cars, decorated bicycles and costumed children will follow Main Street through the center of town. Then it will move down Dexter Street to the Fairgrounds where it will pass in review on the race track in front of the grandstand.

If you plan to take your dog with you on your vacation at the lake or other resort, have him vaccinated against rabies now. Dr. F. S. Leeder, Director of Diseases Control, Michigan Department of Health, advised today.

A dog wandering around in the woods or rural area is apt to encounter a wild animal or another dog which is infected with rabies.

If your dog is bitten by a rabid skunk, squirrel, fox, other wild animal or dog, he may contact rabies and pass it on to members of your family before his illness is recognized, Dr. Leeder pointed out.

To safeguard your pet and your family, consult your veterinarian about having your dog vaccinated now.

Safety Week Set For July 22-28

Circle the week of July 22 to 28 on your calendar. It has been set aside as National Farm Safety Week and Michigan State College farm safety specialists are urging farm families to plan a safety program.

Themes for 1951 will be "Adopt Safe Practices." Records show that 17 million man days were lost last year because of farm accidents. This represents a serious loss in needed farm production.

Falls are the cause of the largest number of farm accidents. Machines and animals rank next, followed by motor vehicles and handling objects. Safety specialists say that the accident toll could be cut sharply by taking extra care with each of these hazards.

German Visitor To Study Rural Life

A German woman, interested in learning how American women and youth are trained and organized in home improvement groups, is spending six months in Michigan with expenses paid by Michigan home economics extension groups.

Miss Ingeborg Timmler, 27, is arriving in early July and, through Michigan State College extension staff members, will work with Michigan home economics groups. She is from Schleswig-Holstein, Germany, and has been a student in home economics at Danzig.

The young woman has expressed a desire to acquaint herself with 4-H groups, their practices and procedures and to return to Germany to help train German country youth and women.

Miss Timmler's first public appearance will probably be at the annual Michigan Homemakers' Conference at Michigan State College, July 10 to 13. About 1,000 members of Michigan home economics extension groups from many counties in the state are expected to attend the session.

State Potato Growers To Vote on Marketing By Mail on July 9-13

Michigan potato growers, who along with other farmers of the North Central area now operating under a federal marketing order, will have another opportunity to reject or continue Marketing Order No. 60. The Production and Marketing Administration has announced that all growers will vote by mail between July 9 and 13.

Clarence Prentice, Michigan State College extension marketing specialist, reports the referendum has been called as a result of inability of the North Central Potato Committee to reach a decision on continuation of the order. The 18 member committee, four of whom are from Michigan, are from all of the six states involved.

Any farmer producing potatoes for the market in 1950 is eligible to vote in the referendum and those not receiving ballots should contact their county PMA offices.

May Recommend Regulations
Marketing Order No. 60 allows the committee to recommend to the Secretary of Agriculture the grade, size and quality regulations on potatoes to be marketed. It was first issued in 1942 but was inoperative in the war years. Regulations were relaxed in 1947. Last year, PMA officials took lengthy testimony both for and against the program. In the vote last fall, producers of potatoes in the six state area favored retention of the order.

Prentice understands that all states covered by the agreement will be considered as a unit and if a majority of the potato producers who grow more than 50 per cent of the potatoes favor termination, it is required that the secretary of agriculture terminate the order.

The agricultural economist urges each potato farmer to weigh carefully the arguments for and against the marketing order and to vote in the referendum.
