

This past week a farmer came in to inquire about a spray to kill wild cherry. It appears these folks lost two animals this past week due to poisoning from wild therry. Apparently, the dry and warm weather has increased the prussic acid content to the point where the dosage was fatal to these animals. This should be a warning to all livestock owners to guard against animal feeding on wild cherry

A 2-4-5, T spray will kill wild cherry brush and small trees.

This is the time of year for woodlot owners to look over their woodlots and decide how much material they should take out next winter. It is a good forestry prac-tice to work the woodlot the same as any other field on the farm, with some products removed each

It is also a good time to check those low, wet woodlands that can-not be worked with farm equip-ment. If they contain sufficient volume, they could be cut out during the summer months by a commercial operator.


