

Stay Alive—Obey Traffic Signals August Slogan

"Stay Alive—Obey Traffic Signals." This slogan will keynote a campaign for greater safety on Michigan's highways and streets during the month of August, sponsored by the State Safety Commission. The State Highway Department is cooperating fully with the State Police, the county sheriffs, and city and village police in an effort to bring to the attention of motorists the necessity for obeying traffic signals.

"Traffic lights do not guarantee safety. In fact, many motorists place too much confidence in traffic lights on the assumption that all other motorists will obey them. When one motorist fails to obey a traffic signal he not only endangers his own life, but also the lives of those motorists who have placed dependence in the lights," State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler points out.

"All motorists know that a red light means 'Stop,' and that a green light means 'Go,' Commissioner Ziegler said. "However, caution should not be relaxed. Many motorists fail to realize that a yellow light between the green and red stop-and-go lights means that the light is changing to red and they should stop. A flashing yellow light means proceed with caution as the location requires extra care in crossing. A flashing red light means 'Stop' and proceed only when it is safe to do so.

"Stop-and-go lights are installed at an intersection after a thorough study of traffic shows the need. The success of these signals depends entirely on the obedience of the motorists. If all traffic signals, markings, and regulations were obeyed by you and all other motorists there would be greatly reduced accidents.

"When a motorist receives his driver's license it becomes his duty to cooperate at all times by obeying traffic signals and helping in every way he can to make Michigan's highways and streets safe for himself and others. "Stay Alive—Obey Traffic Signals."

Is Stephen J. Roth planning to oppose Senator Blair Moody in the 1952 senatorial primary? To avoid heat prostration and sunstroke, the Michigan Department of Health recommends:

Take it easy. Wear loose, porous, lightweight and light-colored clothing. Stay where there is circulation of air. Keep your head covered when exposed to the mid-day sun.

Avoid prolonged exposure to sun and excessive heat—this includes ball games as well as hay fields, the golf course and fishing boat as well as the canning kitchen, the fair midway as well as the downtown street.

Do hard or "hot" work in the cooler part of the day. Take strenuous recreation in small doses. Stop either work or play if you begin to feel ill effects from the heat or sun.

Eat the protective foods you eat the year around—milk, cheese, fruits, vegetables, meat, eggs, whole grain bread and cereal—but cut down on the fried foods, greasy, rich salad dressings and rich desserts.

Cook less. Eat more raw vegetables and fruits. Dip your radishes, carrots, rutabaga or green pepper strips, celery and green onions in iodized salt to increase your salt intake. Have one hot food or beverage to make your meal more satisfying.

Drink plenty of liquids—water, fruit juices, milk, soup, tea or coffee. Don't drink too much cold liquid at any one time and don't increase your intake of alcoholic beverages.

Get a good night's rest, and nap or rest in the early afternoon, if possible. Keep a calm attitude of mind. Save your worrying for cooler days.

Kent Ag. Topics Notes from Kent County Extension

E. W. Reuth, Rosemont Farm, Caledonia has been proud of the record for three cows recently completed on Herd Improvement Registry tests. According to a report of the American Guernsey Cattle Club, the cows and their records are Rosemont C. Pride, 9,208 lbs. milk, 508 lbs. of butterfat; Rosemont Pleasant, 14,808 lbs. milk, 637 lbs. butterfat; Rosemont Margaret, 12,136 lbs. milk, 519 lbs. butterfat. Congratulations!

I was impressed by the quality of the young stock at the Guernsey Parish show at Lowell last week. I think it is a healthy sign to have so many 4-H and F.H.A. youngsters participating in the show. Douglas Antolides, Lowell, can be proud of his herf calf that he won recently at the show. It was named junior champion of the show.

Ken Frey, plant breeder from Michigan State College, was on hand at the Raymond Jost farm last Wednesday to go over the oat variety test plots. In addition to the variety test plots, there were over a hundred experimental crosses on trial plantings. The Kent, Eaton and Clinton varieties looked well. The Bonda and Shelby varieties were somewhat taller and later.

Results of a spring application of 50 pounds per acre of ammonium nitrate on his wheat returned C. R. Johnson of Sparta \$13.29 per acre over the untreated wheat at current prices. The acre receiving the nitrogen yielded 37.2 bushel per acre compared to 30.9 bushel on the untreated acre. According to Mr. Johnson, he applied 400 lbs. of 0-20-10 per acre on his wheat at seeding time last fall. The nitrogen was applied as growth started this spring. He figures he received approximately \$6.00 return for every dollar invested in nitrogen fertilizer. No check plot was made to test the results of the regular fertilizer application.

Egg prices will show a substantial seasonal increase during the next few months especially on quality eggs. During these summer days it's rather difficult to maintain the high quality, but there are some simple things you can do which will help you cash in on this market. Gather eggs of ten, and cool immediately. A cool basement or a special egg cooler may be used, market regularly, on a graded basis. Home economists state that eggs are still one of the cheapest sources for a high protein food despite increased prices.

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Dems Seeking Big Contributions By 'The Little People'

While the Democratic party claims that it is "the consumers' friends" it is not shy about asking "the little people" for campaign contributions, Republican Secretary of State Fred M. Alger, Jr. pointed out today.

A "suggested contribution" schedule received by Alger and other Republican State officials—causing Democratic blishes for the error—proposes the following scale:

Income up to \$3,000—\$25 contribution; \$3,000 to \$6,000—\$50 contribution; \$6,000 to \$10,000—\$100 contribution; and on up the scale to \$1,000 for those in higher salaried brackets.

Printed on the back of the solicitation card is this message, said Alger, a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor:

"It is lawful for any government employee to make a voluntary contribution to the regularly constituted political party of his choice."

Alger pointed out that when Gov. Williams vetoed the gasoline tax increase for better highways, he said it was half a cent too much. That half cent would mean about \$7 to \$9 a year for the average motorist, Alger said.

"But while Williams says he is trying to save the people \$7 to \$9, the Democratic party has no hesitation about asking a \$25 yearly contribution from anyone making less than \$3,000 a year, or \$50 from anyone who makes \$3,001," Alger said.

"Maybe that is being the 'consumers' friend,' but it doesn't seem that way to me. Apparently, the Democratic philosophy boils down to not one cent for highways but millions for politics.

"The carefully noted message for government employees is obvious," Alger continued. "In other words, if you have a job, brother—pay for it. Gov. Williams repudiated this solicitation for funds, yet I listed that on the letterhead he is noted as honorary chairman. Maybe he doesn't know what is going on—and maybe he doesn't want to know."

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N. C. Potato Order To End August 15

According to John McCabe the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today that potato growers in the North Central production area (Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota, and the commercial producing counties of Iowa and Indiana) favored the termination of Federal Marketing Order No. 66, as amended, in a referendum held in the area during the period July 9-13, 1951. The Order authorizes the regulation by grade and size of the handling of Irish potatoes grown in the production area.

The Department reported that of those voting in the referendum, 62.6 percent of the growers and 78.1 percent of production favored termination of the order. Participating in the referendum were approximately 14 percent of the commercial potato growers in the production area. These growers produced about 35 percent of the 1950 crop.

The order will be terminated as of 11:59 p. m., e. s. t., August 15, 1951.

They show the following percentages of increase in the spending during 1950 as compared with 1940:

It shows that the national debt of the United States, which in 1940 was \$29 billion, if stacked in the form of one dollar bills, would tower 60,000 times as high as the Empire State Building. Every man, woman and child is mortgaged about \$1,750 to cover their part of the debt. Is there any question about the need for some down-to-earth economy in Washington?

GP's Need Mail, Entertainment Declares USO

"Mail and entertainment are the two essentials needed for any GI in Korea today," was the message brought home from the Pacific area by Miss Elaine Lewis, a member of USO-Camp Shows Unit No. 975, recently returned to this country.

The unit to which Miss Lewis was attached was the first to be formed after USO was re-activated and spent five weeks touring the hospitals in Japan, front lines in Korea and the Philippines, Guam and Okinawa. The Jack Benny troupe still is in the Pacific.

Miss Lewis told that the troupe played in the dust from rice-paddies or in the torrential rains, often to the accompaniment of distant gunfire. One night the GI's sat on their helmets and water cans while the rain poured down on them," she said. "The roof over the plank stage was a huge square of canvas held up on poles by GI's who worked in teams. On another night shifts of GI's held blankets over the troupe's heads. But the men never missed a show."

"The men think about home and wonder if the people back home are thinking about them," Miss Lewis said. "That is why it means so much for them to get letters—families should write every day—and why it means so much to them to see a USO-Camp Show troupe arrive. After all, the American people send Camp Shows abroad through their contributions to United Campaigns, and just the sight of a show means to the GI's that they are not forgotten."

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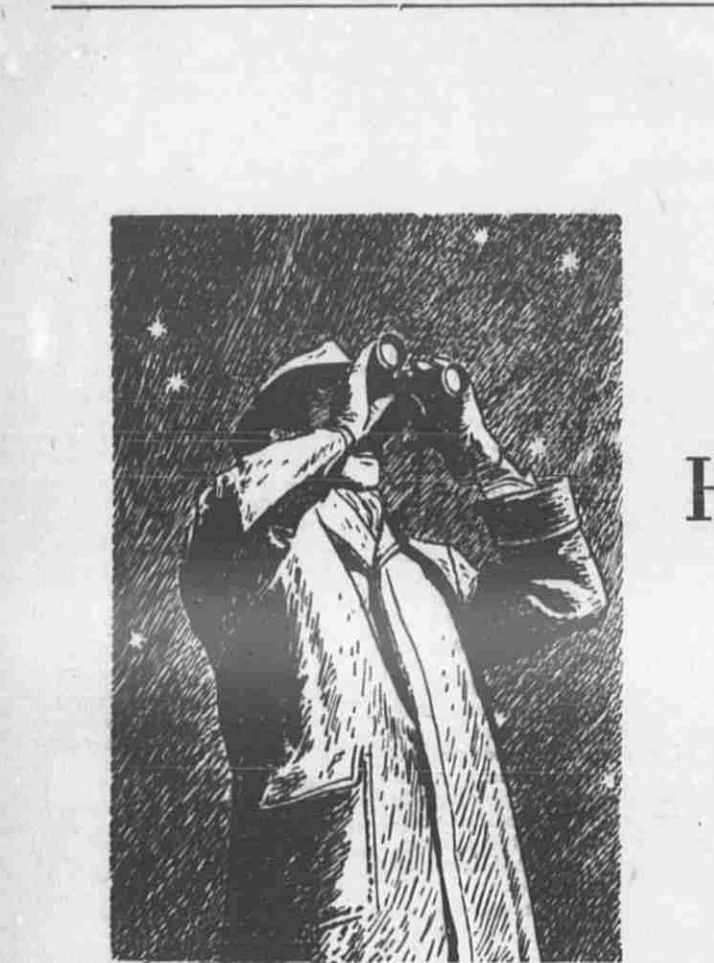

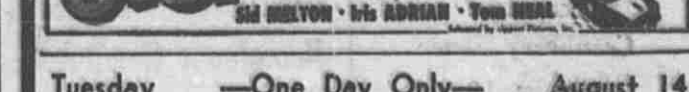
