One of the chemicals available for absorbing moisture is calcium chloride. If a musty odor persists it may be removed by sprinkling chloride of lime in the areas, such as on the basement floor.

A few simple rules will help you prevent mildew growth on clothing and other household articles. Never allow damp or wet articles to lie around. Stretch out to dry all moist or wet, soiled clothing and unironed dampened garments Sprinkle only enough pieces for one day's ironing. Give leather articles a coat of wax before storing-and wax the soles too.

Agriculture

A number of fields of alfalfa are to be seeded judging from the reto be seeded judging from the re-cent preparations over the country. Ranger is the variety which farm-ers should consider since it is resis-tant to alfalfa wilt. This year's source of seed will probably be Cal-ifornia grown. Future seed of this variety will be certified in Mich-

Now is the time to seed Balbon rye for winter cover crops and preparation for next year's potato crop. It's good insurance against potato scab in light of recent investigations.

Yorkwin wheat has proved to be very well adapted to this section of the state. Prospective users of certified seed should buy only such seed as carries the official blue cer-

tification tag.

Cornell No. 595 is a soft white wheat more popular in Southeast Michigan. It is somewhat stiffer strawed but not as winter hardy It has red chaff and white straw ended soft red wheat

Generally speaking, fall seedlings of legumes in wheat is not recom-mended. They do not make enough growth to survive the win-




