Michigan weather, especially in the upper peninsula, hinders the making of good quality feld-cured hay. Tests conducted by Michigan State College's Agricultural Experiment Station measured the range of feeding values possible in hays put up at different periods during the haying season, using three curing methods: early hay crop sllage, mid-season barn-dried hay and late field-cured hay. Michigan farmers who find it difficult to cure hay in the field will be interested to learn that more milk was produced on hay crop sllage than on either field-cured or barn-dried hay. Further information on curing and storing forage is available by calling, writing or visiting your County Agricultural Agent.







REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION Two years of Physical Training will be required

- 2. All subjects in capitals are required; three years of English are 3. Sixteen credits are required; a credit is given for the successful completion of one subject for one year. Students who expect credit in shorthand must also secure credit SUGGESTIONS TO STUDENTS IN ELECTING COURSES
- 1. We believe that the purpose of the high school is two-fold: (1) to offer something of interest to those who will not complete the four years of work and for those who will not continue their education upon graduation, and (2) to act as a college preparatory school. Students and parents should plan courses accordingly. 2. No student can take more than four subjects without permission 3. All elections are subject to the approval of the superintendent or
- 4. Students should elect their subjects according to the number of years they have been in high school. 5. Students who are not enrolled in the commercial course may take a subject in this course if the class is not too large. For example: Any freshman may take business mathematics or geography if the classes are not overcrowded.
- 6. It is recommended that students who have completed one year of Algebra should complete one year of geometry. Those who plan b take Chemistry or Physics should take Algebra and Geometry 7. It is recommended that all boys take at least one year of shop and girls at least one year of home economics. 8. All students who plan on attending college should complete four
- Students taking Agriculture course are urged to take Algebra or Business Mathematics. Those interested in Engineering should plan to complete the fol-lowing credits: English 3 or more, laboratory science, 2 or more and all mathematics. (Language recommended). 11. Those interested in nursing should plan to complete the follow-ing credits: English 3 or more, laboratory science 2 or more. Typewriting is desirable. (Language recommended).
 12. Those interested in medicine or dentistry should plan to complete 2 years of Latin, 2 years of another foreign language, Chemistry, Physics and Biology.
- 13. Students who plan to enter college should attempt to determine just which courses they will pursue, at college and they should learn just what the college will demand of them for enfrance.
- COLLEGE ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS Many colleges require sixteen credits including two major and two minor sequences for entrance and at least a "C" average" A major

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
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
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
