Acting as a sort of spotlight to announce the impending arrival\_of autumn the Harvest Moon will be brightening the skies for several nights starting September 15, Dr. Losh reports. During this time, the moon will rise near sunset and remain above the horizon all night.



Arrange on pieces on baking sheet so that ends meet in the center and each oval covers joining ends of 2 "U" shaped pieces. Let rise until doubled (about 45 minutes). Bake in moderate oven (350°F) about 25 minutes. When cooled, brush with confectioners' sugar icing and then sprinkle with chopped nuts. Makes I coffee cake.


