Delegates attending the sessions of the Michigan State Medical Society in Grand Rapids on Monday voted Dr. Clayton W. Willson, 81, of Sault Ste. Marie as "Michigan's foremost family physician in 1951."

Dr. Willson is a native of Barry county and graduated from Hastings high school, attended University of Michigan two years, and was graduated from Chicago Homeopathic Medical College in 1891.

The history of this physician whose career started in the early lumber camps where operations were performed in family kitchens and when doctors made their calls with snowshoes, on horseback, with horse and buggy, and later with automobiles, is most interesting.

Since registration of births was required by the state in 1908, Dr. Willson has delivered more than 5,000 babies.

Rev. Chas. W. Boman Dies Unexpectedly

Funeral services were held at Wayland Monday afternoon for the Rev. Chas. W. Boman who passed away at his home west of Lowell Saturday. Death was attributed to a heart ailment from which he had been suffering for a few previous years. He was 73 years old and had retired from the ministry.

Rev. Boman was formerly pastor of the Lowell Baptist church, serving this pastorate for several years. He was also an evangelist, of note having traveled in that service with singing and preaching both in Canada and the States. He was a natural artist and had painted charts which he used to illustrate his Bible lectures.

The past three years he has been unable to lecture and was confined to his home mostly but did a great deal of letter writing to other churches and all his friends.

WATERFOWL SEASON OPENS FRIDAY, OCTOBER 12

Michigan's 45-day water fowl season opens October 12, extends through November 25.

Downstate wildfowling gets all the shooting time that federal regulations allow, the conservation commission turns down a recommendation that would have delayed the opening until October 15 to spread first-day hunting pressure over both wildfowl and small game.

State Sales Tax New Schedule Effective Oct. 1

A schedule of rates for use of retailers in applying the state sales tax is being recommended by the Retail Merchants division of the Greater Jackson Assn.

Rate cards have been printed and are available at the GJA office to retailers. The cards list the tax to be charged on sales of 17 cents up to \$20.

The first bracket is from 17 cents to 37 cents, inclusive, 1 cent tax; 38 cents to 67 cents, inclusive, 2 cents tax, and 68 cents to \$1.16, 3 cents tax, and multiples thereof.

The present corresponding sales tax charges are 17 cents to 49 cents, 1 cent; 50 cents to 83 cents, 2 cents, and 84 cents to \$1.17, 3 cents.

Effective Oct. 1 Stores with the new schedules will put them into effect Oct. 1.

The retail division reported that many stores have had to pay more tax money to the state than they collected. Retailers pay 3 per cent on total sales.

Other cities using the proposed new basic for computing the tax are Kalamazoo, Battle Creek and Grand Rapids.

No breakdowns Before approving the new schedule, merchants checked with the local sales tax representative, who said the state law sets up no breakdown computation.

Use of the new schedule is optional to any retailer, the retailers who favor it say.

Catalog mailing rates per pound planned Oct. 1 for local zone will be 10 cents as compared with the present 7 cents. Rates for the other zones will be increased proportionately, Hale said.
