Looks like Joe DiMaggio wasn't all wrong when he turned down a job in professional baseball with the New York Yankees at \$100,000 a year for that of a telecaster at \$50,000.

With this nice new tax bill that's coming along with the happy new year, Mr. DiMaggio's slice for the Government on \$100,000 would be about \$8,000—give or take a bit, and making no allowance for higher rates due to other income he might have. On his \$50,000 he will have to pay the Government only about \$2,000, plus or minus a few odd bucks.

On that basis, if Mr. DiMaggio undertook his arduous labors for \$100,000 he would have left for take-home pay around \$32,000. On his new \$50,000 job he will take home about \$23,000.

It's a curious business when a man can work for take-home pay of \$32,000, submit to \$50,000 salary out and still take home \$23,000. It looks like Mr. DiMaggio is even smarter than we thought.

The only fellow who's out-smarted himself is Uncle Sam. The deal cost him \$45,000.

The larger towns and cities are not pleased with the new arrangement recently announced by the post office department in which parcel post service is made discriminatory.

For example a first class post office town, such as Grand Rapids, cannot mail packages larger than 7 1/2 inches in length and 7 1/2 inches in girth, nor over 20 pounds in weight unless mailing to a second, third or fourth class post office.

Meanwhile the same kind of package in a small town, like Lowell, may be mailed parcel post even though its combined length and girth may be 100 inches, and weight 70 pounds.

To manufacturers this seems to be a serious problem and one wonders why the federal government penalizes business in the first class areas.

Roger Babson, who for some strange reason is regarded as quite a financial wizard, comes up with this one in his forecast and advice for 1952: "If you invest in bonds, buy those which will mature about the time you expect to die. Then your survivors will find them easier to sell."

May we remark that if a fellow knew just when his own expiration date was going to be—he could make some other smart moves, too. Such as not sending out his laundry, or not starting any serial stories.

## Lowell Men Fall For 'Hot' Sweaters Five Found Here

Sweater salesman stopped in the village last week long enough to sell unsuspecting customers "hot" sweaters which proved to be the highly inflammable garments for which police and fire officials have been looking, and a warning has been issued to all to take extra precaution and if not sure the new sweater is safe, call an officer.

Monday afternoon Lowell police officers, fire chief and others made a demonstration in the presence of several townspeople. Taking one of the newly purchased sweaters out in the alley they lighted a match near the garment which immediately flared and was consumed by flames in a matter of seconds.

Such a garment is highly dangerous and anyone who has purchased one of them from a stranger should contact either the police or fire department. They are "spray" to the touch similar to spun glass. There is no trade mark to show where they are manufactured except that a mark is on the inside of some of them to distinguish the type or style of garment. The manufacturer is as yet unknown, and the purpose of this dangerous sweater is a mystery.

Five of these sweaters are known to have been purchased here in Lowell and there may be others which have not been reported. The peddlers made a house-to-house canvass in Grand Rapids, Detroit and other cities, it is stated and the sweater sets are attractive looking and bargain-priced so that the customer seemed well pleased with his purchase.

**B-P Club Member In Cancer Survey**

Mrs. Elmer Schaeffer, member of the Business and Professional Women's Club in Lowell, has been named chairman for Lowell to participate in a nation-wide survey to determine the relationship between smoking and lung cancer by Frank R. Neuman, Kent County chairman.

First of a series of area meetings throughout the state was held January 7 in Grand Rapids. Explaining the survey and methods of obtaining information were Dr. E. C. Hammond, director, Statistical research section of the Medical and Scientific Department, Dr. David Schwartz and Dr. John Skory all of the staff of the American Cancer Society, New York City.

"The death rate from lung cancer has been rapidly rising since 1880 in all parts of the United States, North and South, both urban and rural areas," said Dr. Hammond. "This seems to indicate that the factor causing lung cancer is very widespread."

The survey in the Michigan area is outlined by Dr. Hammond will be taken by 16,000 volunteer workers of the American Cancer Society. They will record the smoking habits of 100,000 to 500,000 white males between the ages of 50 and to 69 years and once a year thereafter each researcher will report whether his cases are alive or not. In case of death, the ACS medical committees will seek the cause of death from death certificates or other medical records.

This farm consisting of 260 acres and two sets of buildings has been in the Klahn family over sixty years and has been owned by Verne for 22 years. He was born on the farm and has always lived here. He attended school in Lowell and was interested in agriculture.

Mrs. Klahn is the former Myrtle Boyd and a native of Ohio. She attended nurses training school and received her RN at Butterworth hospital. The couple have a son and two daughters. The son Fred, and family live on the farm and assist in operating it. He graduated from Lowell High School in 1945 and was active in 4-H and FFA. One daughter, Lois, now Mrs. Phillip Seese, also graduated from Lowell schools in 1946 and she, too, was active in 4-H work. The other daughter, Phyllis is a sophomore in Lowell High School. 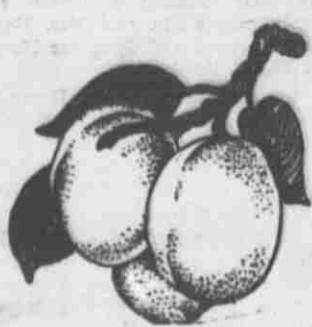
