

Cascade Farmer Identifies Photo In Ledger Quiz

The 'Lucky' farm pictured in last week's Ledger is the Timmer place located on Buttrick avenue in Cascade township and was purchased in 1904 by the late Frank Timmer. His son Jay operates the farm of 160 acres and says he really likes farming.

There are 137 acres under cultivation and the rest of the property is woodlot. Jay, who was born on the farm, received his education in Gove school and has always been interested in agriculture. He has a grade Holstein herd, a team of horses, and 250 laying Rhode Island Red hens, and produces mostly hay and grain from his fields. He also operates an egg and poultry route. He uses both horses and tractor for power on the farm.

There are two barns, one large one for the milking cows and hay and grain, and a new basement barn for the young stock and storage for tools on the main floor. Also during the past four years a new milk house has been built and new tool sheds added.

In the home with Jay are two of his sisters, Beatrice and Irene, and two married sisters, Mrs. Peter Gilder and Mrs. Henry Heemstra, live on nearby farms. The mother died while her children were young and the father passed away last fall.

Mr. Timmer called at the Ledger office Tuesday morning and identified the picture and was given the gift certificates provided by the businessmen sponsoring the Photo Quiz.

Dairy Farmers' Outlook Good as Demand Grows

At a recent meeting of the American Dairy Association held in Grand Rapids a shortage of milk was predicted by Charles Stone, secretary-manager of the organization. He added that this shortage is inevitable and will be reached before the end of the year, giving rise to his reasons for the belief that consumption of milk and cheese has increased at least six percent. Also that population is on the increase while the cow population is decreasing.

Extension Agricultural Economist Art Mauch of Michigan State College points out that the future of dairying for Michigan farmers is looking better and adds that this is certainly no time to get out of the dairy business. He explains that average prices received for milk and butterfat went up 17 per cent in 1951, more than the increase in beef cattle and all farm products lumped together. However, Mauch says, that doesn't mean that dairy farmers are better off than other farmers, but that they are not as far behind as they were last year.

Making the picture brighter for dairy farmers is the fact that production is going up faster than milk production. In 1949 farmers in the country produced 119 billion pounds of milk—the same amount expected for 1952. But there are 20 million more people to use it.

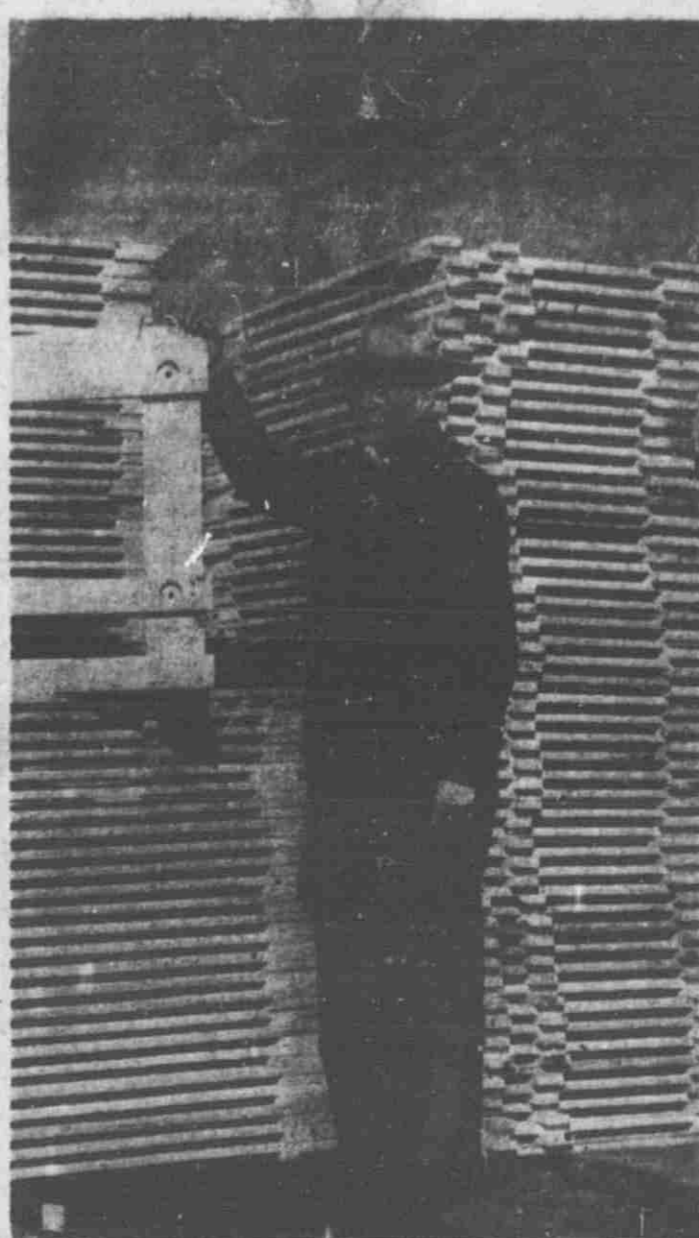

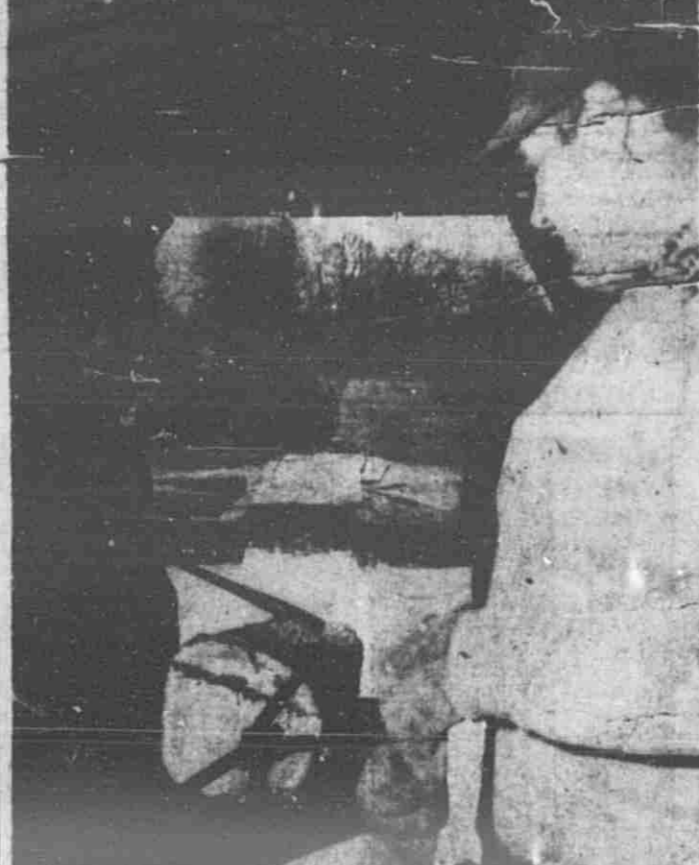

New Lowell Industry Converts Farm Woodlots Into Cash Crop



Ray Cornell has brought to Lowell a new industry that is converting farm woodlots into crating for industry at an astonishing rate with up to 24 employees turning out \$1,000 a day in crating. Carrying on the complete operation from cutting the trees, hauling them to the mill, sawing into lumber, cutting, nailing and delivering the finished crating to factories of Michigan.

Among the projects now under way are crating for stoves and refrigerators for Gibson Refrigerator at Greenville and pallet units for tank wheels for Motor Wheel at Lansing. The Lowell mill is capable of turning out \$250,000 a year in crating.



Sawing the logs from the farms near Lowell into crating material are pictured left to right, Jim Wheat, Clyde Fairchild and Otto Cornell who send 10,000 board feet into the saws every day to build the thousands of crates needed by industry. In a continuous process the logs are converted in a matter of minutes from raw material to the finished product. Ray Cornell has set up an efficient production line which really produces. The modern saw mill also processes farmer custom work and boards and timbers that are sold at the yard.

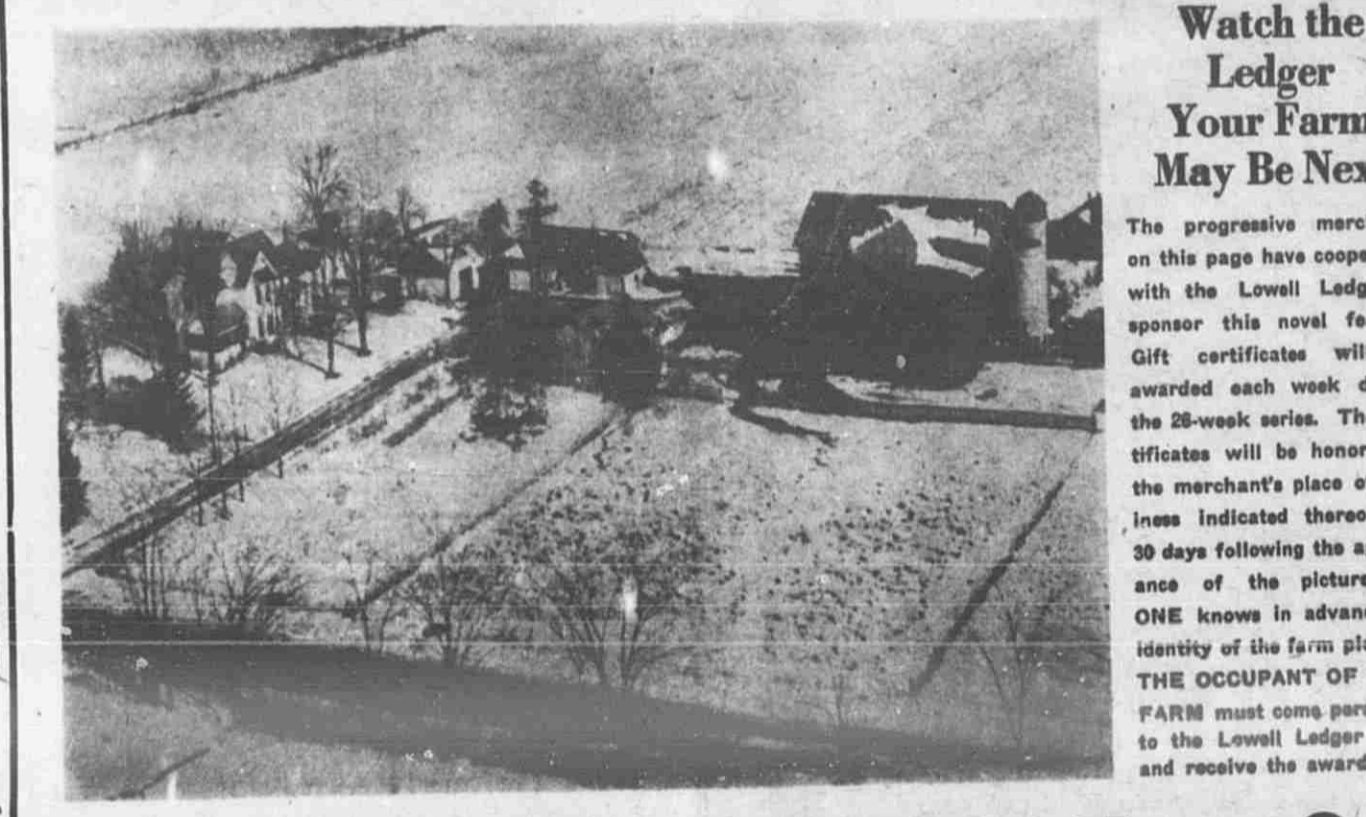

Notes from Kent Co. Exten. Office

Agriculture

Oat planting time is soon here. Remember the oat tests have shown that it is best to plant certified seed. Seed is going fast. Varieties recommended are Clinton, Eaton and Kent for this area. H. J. Huyck tells me he is out of seed oats for this year. Better get them right now.

Inspection time for plant materials is here again according to C. A. Boyer, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry at Lansing. If you have any plant materials such as nursery stock, perennials and others to sell inspection is necessary before you are able to dispose of them. Raspberries and strawberries are also on this inspection list. If you have these to sell please write directly to C. A. Boyer, Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Plant Industry, Lansing, Mich.

You might be thinking about putting in some laying hens for next year. With egg prices down the level they are today it is possible that the poultry business might be pretty good another year.

Keep a close lookout for common barberry bushes. Remember, they are the host for stem rust on wheat and oats. The pest drive on the eradication of these bushes has been very successful. It pays to take them out and destroy them.

I hope many of the 4-H folks saw the "share-the-fun" broadcast on TV Sunday. If you missed it, Kalamazoo will show the same program at 6:30 p. m. March 23. A Michigan winner in this national contest is featured.
