Michigan Bell Telephone Strike Eased in Lowell

When more than 18,000 CIO telephone operators and maintenance men walked off their jobs in Michigan Bell Company exchanges throughout the state Monday morning at six o'clock to enforce wage demands, Lowell operators not belonging to the union have done what they could to ease the situation here and have given service locally and handled emergency calls on toll lines as well as they were able.

Added to the five-day-old Western Union telegraph walkout and the 43-state strike of Western Electric employees, the Bell strike has brought on one of the worst communications tieups in the history of Michigan.

Indications Wednesday morning are that an agreement may be reached within a short time. In fact, it is expected at any time. But strikes are not easily settled and the tieup might last a good while.

- 1 pkg. yeast, compressed or dry
- 1/4 cup water (lukewarm for compressed yeast, warm for dry)
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3/4 cups sifted Enriched King's Flour (about)
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract (if desired)
