Parks to be Improved

Fallenburg Park, according to Joe Spear, caretaker, is to have a new ball park on the land recently acquired for that purpose across from the entrance of the park.
The land is being tilled and graded for a ball diamond to meet all regulations as to size and condition. The old ball park will be used for softball and other games and sports with added picnic tables around in the shaded places. Many other minor improvements are being made in this popular park.

The farm pictured in last week's Ledger photo quiz has been identified by the owners as the Reuben Lee farm on US16 near the Ionia-Kent county line.

The home is nicely located in a setting of maple and walnut trees with enough shrubbery for an attractive landscape. The house was built on the site of the one destroyed by fire in 1933 and is entirely new. It is finished throughout in maple or oak from a farm they formerly owned in Bowne township.

Other buildings are the well house, garage, toolshed, chicken coop and well arranged barn.

Mr. Lee practiced general farming until six years ago since which time he has dealt in feeder cattle.

The Lees met at Ferris Institute, Big Rapids where both were students and they are members of the F. I. Alumni Assn. of Grand Rapids. They are also active in church, grange and social groups. Mr. Lee is a member of the Masonic Order and Mrs. Lee is a member of O. E. S. and the Scribblers Club of the L. C. of Grand Rapids.

Mr. Lee first bought the Ferdinand Leese farm near Alto, now owned by John Krebs, in 1904 which he sold in 1908 and purchased the 120-acre present home on US16 which was known as the Levi Fletcher place.
