General Farming Chosen Life Work Of Young Couple

The photographer who was taking pictures for the Ledger Photo Quiz last fall, from his airplane caught a nice view of the 200-acre farm owned by Alton Mick near Clarksville, and Mr. Mick came to this office Friday morning to identify it. They were given an engraved framed picture of the place from his mother, and the heirs and planned to make his life work a career of farming at his boyhood home.

Mr. Mick, a graduate of Clarksville, and Phyllis Yeater, a graduate of Lowell High School, both born on farms and interested in agriculture, were married and took over the place for their home and business. Mr. Mick follows a program of general farming, not only his own 200 acres, but a forty which he rents. His cattle are Purebred Holstein with about 16 milkers and some 20 heifers and calves. He keeps about 100 sheep and lambs, 60 Yorkshire pigs, and some poultry. Great crops of alfalfa and other hay, grain and corn are raised to feed these farm animals.

As the picture was taken he had just finished filling silo and the corn in the background was ready to be picked.

The house is of modern design, having been built less than 25 years ago and has been well cared for. The landscaping is attractive with large pine trees and maples for shade.

There is a large dairy barn, sheep barn, hog house, poultry house, shop and a cement block tool shed built two years ago.

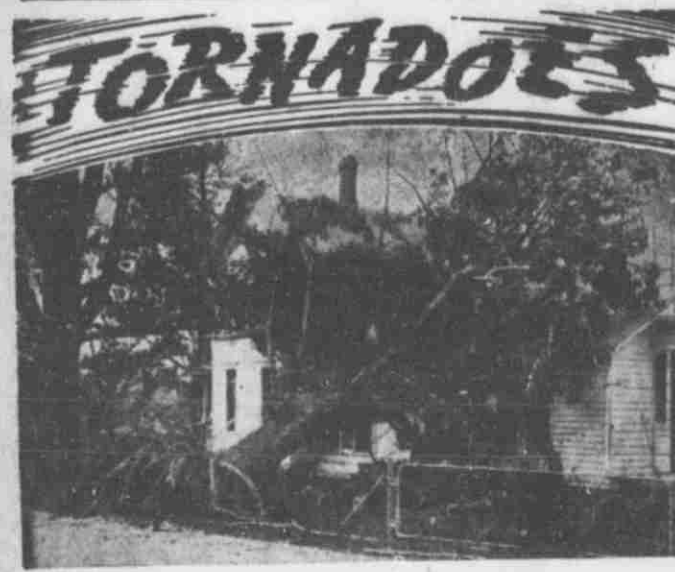

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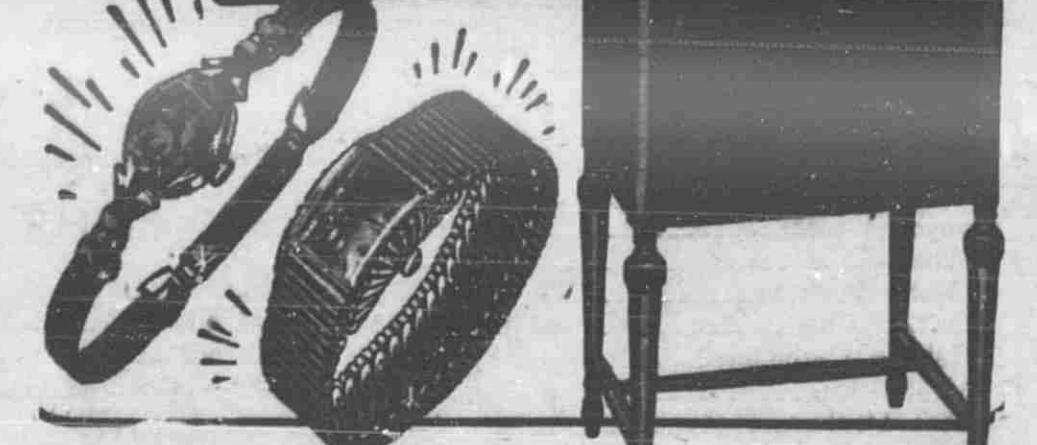

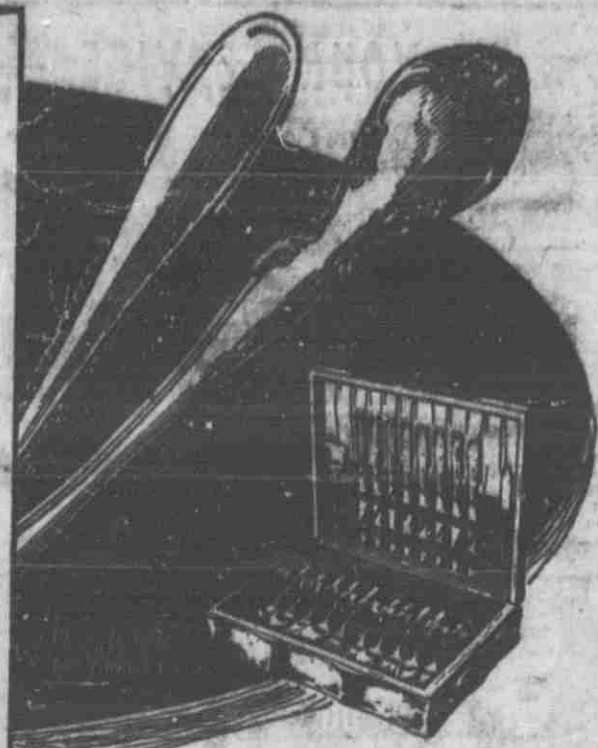

Trout Season Opener Said Best in Years

First 1952 tally of license agent returns, reflecting earlier and excellent opening of general and trout fishing seasons, indicates a 17 to 86 percent faster license sales pace than last year at this time.

Latest but no where near complete reports to the conservation department show 17 percent more or 164,909 resident licenses issued, 30 percent more or 6,087 annual nonresident permits, and 96 percent more or 4,792 trout stamps issued. Retail minnow dealers total 708 or 14 percent more and wholesalers number 99 or 22 percent more than before.

General and trout fishing seasons opened together on April 26 this year. Last year, regular trout season started April 28 but general season anglers did not get underway until June 25.

This year's opening weekend weather was the best in years.
