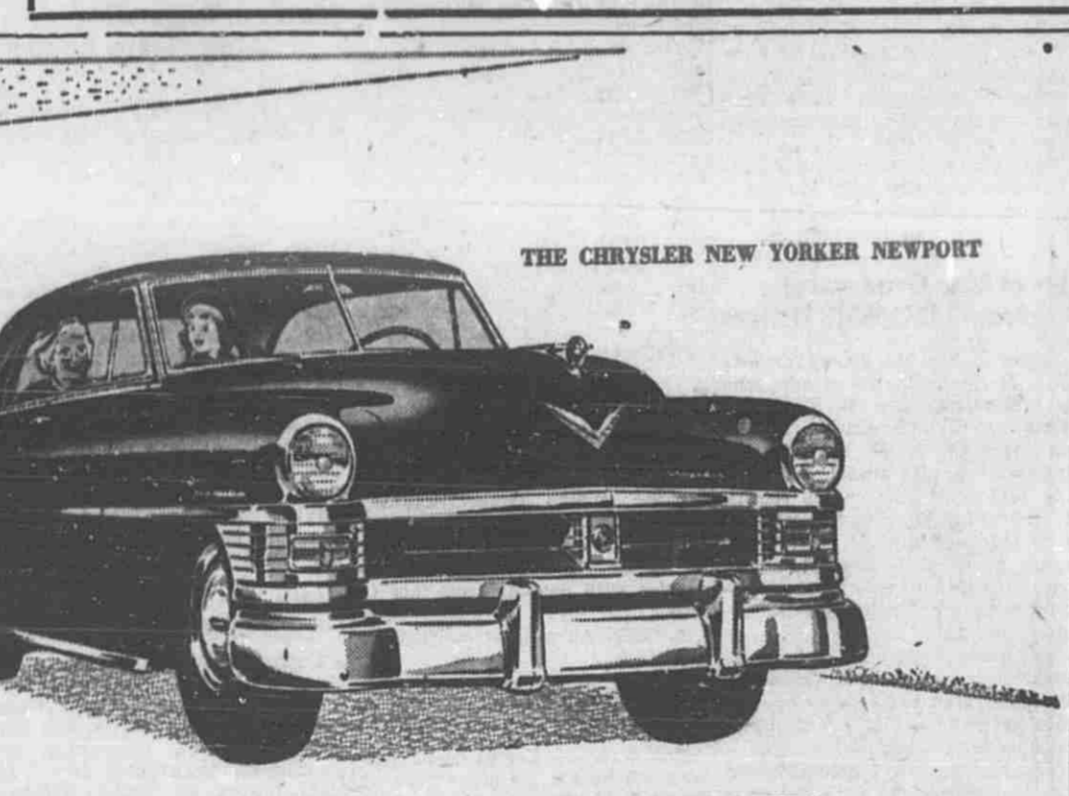

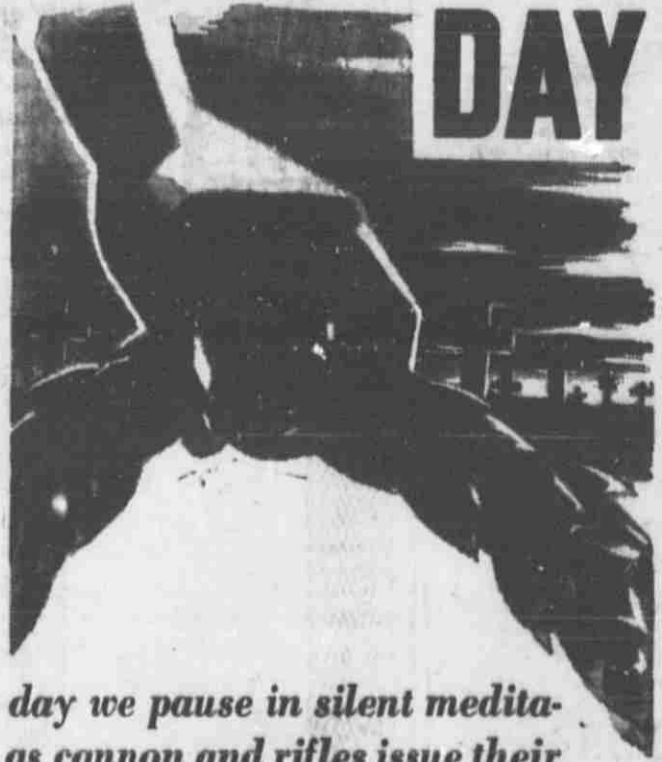

Notes from Kent Co. Exten. Office

Agriculture

Wilbur Kellogg, farm planner for Soil Conservation Service, says that the nitrogen on wheat is certainly showing up in fields that had an application this spring. The wheat is greener and taller than the fields that had no treatment. Nitrogen fertilizer has a good place on fields that are rather poor. You might want to use some on your corn fields this summer. If corn starts dying, it needs nitrogen. Apply 40 lbs. of actual nitrogen per acre sometime in July before the corn starts tasseling.

Farmers will have opportunity to have their wheat ground tested this fall when the soil testing laboratory will go on tour again. Plans are to test soil during the first and second week of August at eight different locations in the county. Keep this in mind and bring your samples out.

Spring Season's Total Nearly Matches 1951 In State Fire Loss

Fire continues to chew through Michigan forests and farmlands with the conservation department reporting 171 more blazes gutting nearly 1,000 acres.

This brings the spring season's total to 603 fires and over 4,180 acres damage, nearly matching the entire loss in 1951 of 4,400 acres by 609 fires.

Home Economics

Runs and breaks in stockings harass just about every woman at some time or other. But don't resign yourself as one who is always "hard on hose."

Take care when you select hosiery and then take care after you have them and you will lengthen stocking lifetime.

It is not enough to tall the salesgirl you want sheer or service weights. Know the correct size (and remember to get them big enough to avoid undue strain) and know the gauge and denier numbers.

The length should be so that the garter fastens to the reinforced top rather than the sheer part beneath, but hose that are too short may break from too much pull.

Gauge indicates the fineness or closeness of knit; denier the fineness of nylon yarn. Today 81 gauge is considered low or coarse, 74 gauge is medium, 60 is fine, and 66 very fine. In denier 15 or 20 is fine yarn used in sheer hose and 30 the heavier for service weight hose.

Very fine yarn calls for a fine or close knit to endure the tension of wear. Thus, 15 or 20 denier hose can be expected to last longer in the close 60 or 66 gauge rather than the 51. The heavier 30 denier, however, can give good wear in 51 gauge or lower. Brands differ in wearing quality, so when you find one that wears well, remember it for your next purchase.
