





Colored lights help sorters of fruits and vegetables to detect small but important defects before processing. In a new technique developed in the agricultural engineering department of Michigan State College, plain white, blue and red fluorescent lights were tested. Under blue fluorescent light, sorters spotted defects 10 to 30% more efficiently than under white fluorescent. Under red fluorescent, sorter efficiency increased an average of 64% over white. 

I tablespoon sugar

1/4 cup lukewarm water

1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup shortening

11/4 teaspoons salt

3 eggs, beaten slightly 41/2 cups sifted King's Enriched

1. Combine yeast, I tablespoon sugar and lukewarm water. Mix well.

2. Add sugar, shortening and salt to scalded milk. Cool. 3. Add beaten eggs and yeast mixture to scalded milk.

4. Add flour and mix thoroughly.

5. Put dough in a greased bowl, brush with melted shortening, cover and chill in refrigerator.

6. Put 1/4 of dough on lightly floured board and roll into an 8-inch circle about 1/3 inch thick. Brush with melted shortening. Cut like a pie into 8 pieces. Beginning with the wide end, roll up toward the point.

7. Place on greased pan and let rise until double in bulk, about 1 or 11/2

8. Bake in a preheated oven at 375 degrees F. for 12 to 15 minutes. Brush with melted shortening. (About 21/2 dozen).




