



Spot-Free Clothes Tips For Summer Worries not reproducing at all, and these and their reaction to public opineasy, as the old song says. But

there are a few complications for nomemakers in keeping clothes lean and spot-free. Cecile Gebhart, county home demonstration agent, offers some tips on stain removal from rayon abrics, both washable and non-

Cecile Gebhart Offers

Fruit stains are common these days and need special attention, she warned. Don't use soap on rayon that is fruit stained. Inead, rinse with warm water if he fabric is washable rayon. If the stain persists, use a very mild eaching solution (on white fabrice only) and then ringe in a weak solution of vinegar and water. For non-washable rayons that have been stained by fruits, sponge with uke-warm water immediately, in stain as quickly as possible Miss Gebhart advised.

Grass stains on a favorite rayon dress can be whisked off with immediate attention, she said. If the rayon is washable, sponge the stain with diluted alcohol, and then wash in warm soap water. For nonwashable rayons, sponge the grass stain with alcohol using a light rushing movement from the out side of the spot toward the cenr. This brushing movement pre ents a ring forming on the fabric. Ice cream stains are common nese days, and fortunately, easy remove. Sponge the spot with cold water if it is a washable rayon. 




