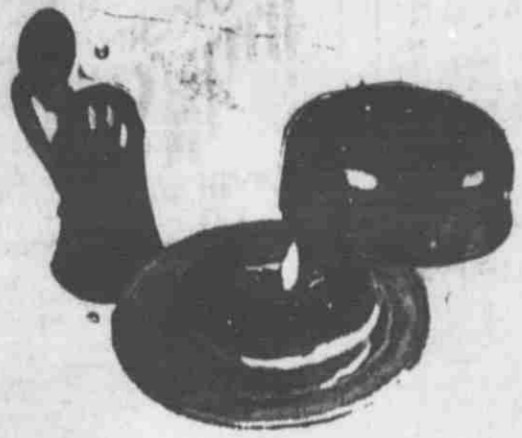

On July 10, 1952, ordered that an order of the Commission adopted on July 10, 1951, shall be amended to read as follows:

STATE OF MICHIGAN—ORDER OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION—RACCOON—LOWER PENINSULA

The Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 230, P. A. 1925, hereby orders that for a period of two years from October 1, 1951, it shall be unlawful to trap raccoon in Zone 2, excepting from November 15 to December 31, inclusive, and in Zone 3, excepting from December 1 to December 31, inclusive.

Pine Seedlings Ready For Fall Transplanting Order From Forestry

Some 18,000,000 seedlings and transplants will be available from state conservation nurseries for fall planting and the department now is prepared to accept applications. Farmers and other landowners should send requests for application blanks only to the department's forestry division office, Lansing.

For the first time a substantial amount of stock will come from the old federal Wyman nursery near Manistiquic, which the department is operating along with the regular Higgins Lake and Hardwood nurseries.

Five Classes Available

Five classes of pine available are two-year-old red, white and jack pine, red pine transplants and two-year-old Scotch pine. Prices are \$1 a thousand except for a thousand for jack pine seedlings and \$4 a thousand for red pine transplants. Orders for Scotch pine are limited.

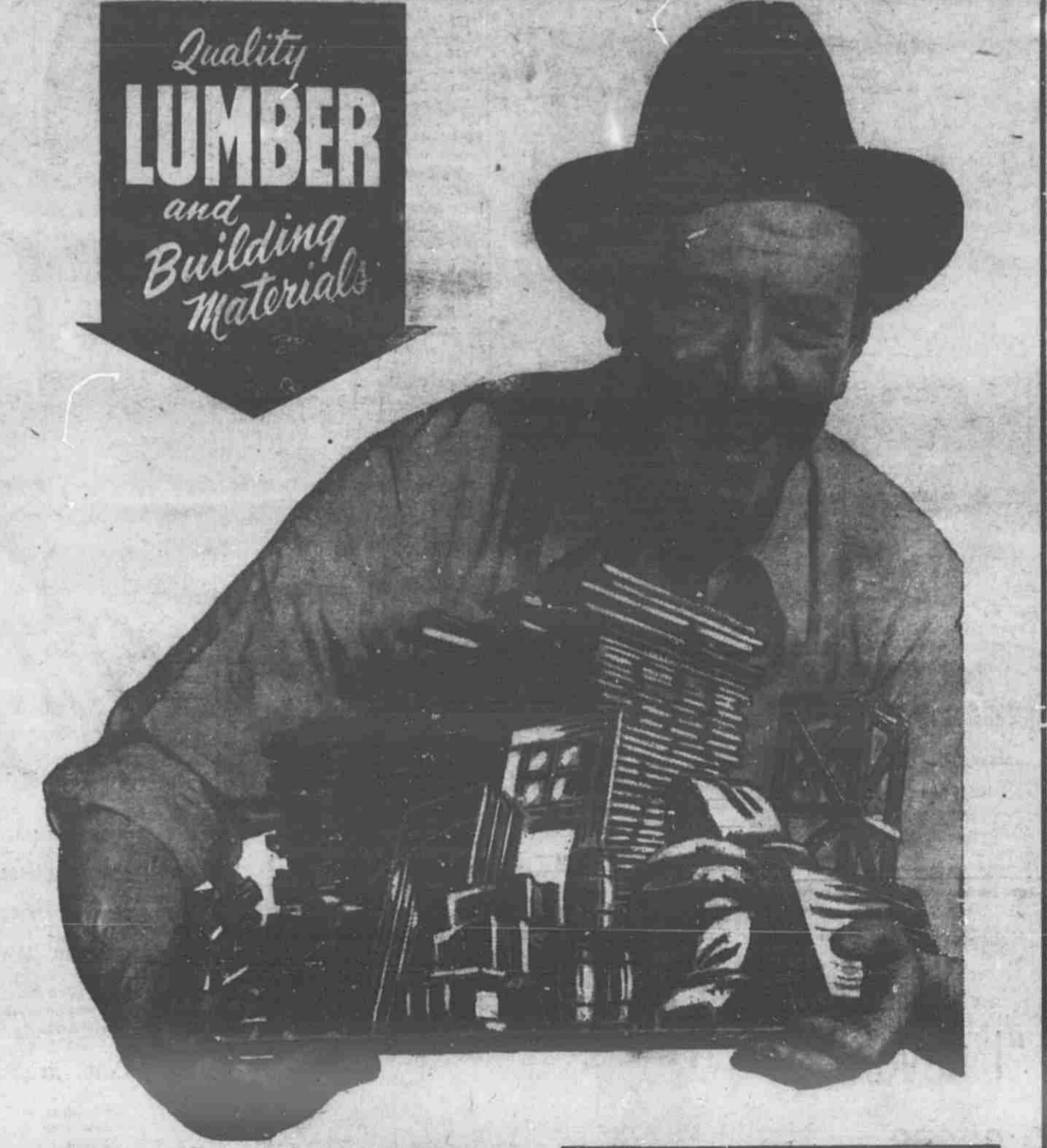
