# **STEVE Says**:

### It's The Feed That Makes The Eggs

Feed is the raw material from which the egg is manufactured. An egg cannot be made unless the hen receives in her feed all the elements that go into an egg. A good laying ration will contain these.

Start pullets on laying ration when they begin to lay. Keep feed before them at all times and follow a fixed feeding schedule. Green feed can be provided by keeping a rack of alfalfa, soybean or clover hay before the birds.

Give them a constant supply of oyster shell or some form of calcium, and hard grit.

Provide cool, fresh water at all times in summer. In winter keep the water fresh and do not allow it to freeze. A good scratch can consist of two parts yellow corn and one part of wheat or oats. Feed lightly in the morning, heavily in the evening.
