Prospects Bright For Lowell's New Parochial School

With a goal of \$50,000 set by the finance committee of St. Mary's Parish apparently in sight, prospects look very bright for a new Catholic school for Lowell, director of the campaign for funds announced this week.

The school, estimated to cost in the neighborhood of \$75,000 with some \$25,000 raised by previous efforts, the work of raising the additional \$50,000 necessary is going ahead satisfactorily under the direction of King Doyle.

A 5-acre site for the school has already been purchased on Amity street and if the financing is completed in time the school is expected to be ready by next fall.

Members Meet at Dinner

Last Sunday more than 250 members of the parish attended a potluck dinner at noon at the City Hall which was followed by discussion of the campaign plans for the Parochial school.

The Rev. Fr. Speer Strahan introduced His Excellency Most Reverend Francis J. Hass, D. D., who made a moving appeal for Christ's ideas and education and his talk was well received by his listeners.

King Doyle, chairman of the Campaign for the school project, presented the business like side of the picture and made a most informative talk.

The Rev. John McGee of St. Andrew's Cathedral in Grand Rapids, was also introduced and spoke to the people of the parish concerning the new project.

The Lowell Red Arrows turned in one of their poorest performances in the year when they bowed to the Lee Rebels at Godfrey Field last Friday night. If the Lowellies had elected to play up to their capabilities they could have won this tussle and moved up in the conference standings. After a scoreless first quarter the Red Arrows bogged down and were never in the ball game. The Lee attack proved to be a one-man affair built around Dave Lee, who went over for two touchdowns in the second quarter and one in the third stanza.

Lowell's only offensive gesture came in the final period of the game when a series of passes, Hartley to Antonides and Hartley to Shepard clicked with Shepard's smashing over from the three-yard marker to score. The Arrows had a couple of other scoring opportunities, but fumbles and penalties halted any offensive the Arrows were able to generate.

To Play Host To Rockford

This week the Arrows will play host to the Rockford Rams in what has been designated as the Lowell High Homecoming. Extensive plans are being made by all of the grades to make this a great event. The bands will enliven half-time activities when the Homecoming Queen will be crowned.

As for the game itself, the outlook for an Arrow win is very dim. Last year the Rams failed to win a single conference game, this year they have come up with a powerhouse that lost only one game by a very slim margin to the Godwin team, champions of the league. This will be the final game of the year and the final chance of the Senior members of the squad to represent the Lowell cause on the gridiron. The Arrows have proven to be an in and out team all year, and if Friday night is one of their nights they are capable of giving Rockford a very interesting evening.

New Sewer and Water Program Approval Sure

Twenty-one citizens were present at the council meeting on Monday night to urge the council to go ahead with the proposed new sewer and water construction and raise the rates to pay for these improvements. The council, which hesitated to place the rate increase in effect, asked for an expression of the citizens present at the meeting and it was unanimous that the project warranted the increased rates.

The increased water rates and the new sewer service charge will increase the average citizen's yearly bill by some 300 percent but it will enable the village to complete the sewer and water system to all built up sections of the village. It will also allow the expansion of the source of water, give adequate fire protection and surface drainage to the village.

The new rates are expected to be placed in effect for the first quarter of next year, billings are expected to be made monthly instead of quarterly. The council will no doubt order the new rates effective on January 1st at their next regular meeting.

Some Interesting Enrollment Facts Brought to Light

In making reports to state agencies relative to school enrollments and non-resident membership, Supt. W. W. Gumsier states several interesting facts were brought to light.

In Graded School District No. 1, which in general includes the village and South Lowell, it was found that there were 389 children in the kindergarten and first eight grades. In the same grades there were only 45 non-resident children who are largely from three closed districts.

The enrollments in the upper four grades are even more interesting. There are only 128 resident students in high school but 263 from outside of the district. It can easily be seen that without the non-resident students, Lowell would not be able to provide an enriched course of study.

It is interesting to note also that these 113 non-resident high school students bring in a total of \$7,000 in state allowances for membership and tuition this year. This does not include about \$18,000 in transportation, which is paid on a cost basis.

The total receipts for the 562 resident pupils, including local taxes, will be \$110,250.00. The gross average per-pupil for non-residents (exclusive of transportation) is \$244.00, while the gross average per pupil for resident pupils (including taxes) is \$195.00.

Part of the non-resident receipts are used to pay for the grade building. Some is placed each year in the building and site fund and when the new wing on the high school was erected, \$25,000 of the non-resident receipts were used to help defray the costs of that structure.

Rotary Pays Visit to New School Department Household Arts Home

Local Rotarians as a rule, complement their weekly luncheons with discussions of matters of national or international importance. At times their speakers touch upon new scientific discoveries, but last week they digressed a bit into the realms of music under the guidance of Walter Gumsier, program chairman. He introduced Miss Hoff, a teacher of vocal music in our high school, whose personal charm was surpassed only by the charm of her musical artistry. She sang a group of songs that blended beautifully and held our Rotarians spellbound.

For some reason the High School Barbershoppers and the Girls Chorus were unable to appear and Mr. Gumsier filled in the gap in the program by rendering a solo that rounded out the musical program to the enjoyment of all present.

Another part of last week's unusual program was the report presented by the Junior Rotarian for the month of October, Don Schroeder. It was the longest and most comprehensive speech ever made by a Junior Rotarian and after he had explained in detail his impressions of the four Lowell Industries he had investigated, he complimented the club on the excellent publicity the Lowell Ledger gives the weekly programs of Rotary.

The practice of the club in appointing a Junior Rotarian each month is an excellent idea and Don Schroeder's fine speech is proof of its effectiveness.

Visit Household Arts

After the meeting the Rotary, in a body, visited the Smith house, the new home of the Household Arts department of our High School, and were much impressed with the fine results from this project. In the atmosphere existing here the young women of the Home Economics class should develop into real home makers.

Gen. Eisenhower Wins in Landslide As Record-Breaking Vote is Polled Williams, Moody Slightly in Lead



General Dwight D. Eisenhower won his election to the presidency by a vast majority practically all over the United States by piling up masses of votes in places which had been considered uncertain and the surprise of the republican landslide for Ike has thrilled the nation. He even split the Southland and has made friends everywhere as a great leader. When Governor Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, Ike's opponent, conceded his defeat he spoke the highest words of praise and pledged his support to the newly elected president and urged all Americans to give Gen. Eisenhower the same support and to have the faith of a united people in democracy "to move forward with God's guidance in freedom, dignity and peace."

The election returns have been very gratifying in that such a large percentage of votes were cast in precincts all over the nation. Locally the voting is estimated at from 75 percent to 90 percent of the registered electors. The large vote has signified from the first that the people favored a change; and when the votes were counted Eisenhower and Nixon were way out in front leading to a sweeping Republican victory.

The contest for governor is very close and as we go to press the final count has not been announced, though Alger had big majorities throughout the state with the exception of the Detroit area. Williams has a strong lead in that locality.

Amendments were unusually well voted, very few ballots being cast in blank as is often done when amendments are not generally understood. Farm organizations and others have worked skillfully through the campaign to educate voters on the importance of casting their vote on the constitutional amendment proposals and the results point to well organized work and the rural plan carried in most precincts in the state which also stamped approval to Proposal No. 1.

Lowell township turned out a large vote in each of the two precincts which totalled 1368 from a registration of some 2200 resulting in big Republican majority in each office.

Ada township had a high percentage of voting with 1078 ballots from a 3225 registration. The proposition for repealing the present Zoning Ordinance was defeated 752 to 258.

Cascade township turned out with 1053 electors at the polls and in the two special propositions it was voted 2 to 1 to close taverns on Sunday and the proposal to sell liquor by the glass was turned down 2 to 1.

Our neighboring townships, Boston and Keene, in Ionia county report a heavy vote, Boston with 1000 on the registration passed out 910 ballots and true to form Boston went strong for the Republican ticket. Keene experienced the largest election in years when 327 of the 394 registered voters were at the polls and of the number Eisenhower had 240 votes to Stevenson's 54.

The Propositions to increase Tax for new jail in Kent county and to levy Tax for the jail were both defeated by strong majorities. On the Proposed Amendments to the Constitution No. 1 was voted "Yes", No. 2 "No" and No. 3, "Yes".

American Legion Sponsors Supper On Armistice Eve

Clark-Ellis American Legion Post is sponsoring an Armistice Eve supper and memorial at the city hall Monday evening, Nov. 10, at 7 o'clock. All servicemen from all wars in all branches of service are cordially invited and there is no charge for the supper. Veterans of Foreign wars are especially invited to be in attendance.

Co-chairmen Gerald Rollins and Jack DeGraw and their committees are trying to contact each of the 150 servicemen in this community to extend a personal invitation hoping to have a big representation out for this occasion.

The program will be highlighted by Richard Bieri, just back from Korea, who will tell some interesting experiences and will try to answer any questions that these veterans might like to ask. Edward Minard and Vern Keim, also back from Korea are expected to be present and take part in the discussions. Group singing of war songs will also be featured.

Another feature of the evening's program will be Chief Quartermaster Signalman Glenn H. Conner, of Naval Reserve Recruiting Station in Grand Rapids, who was an eyewitness to the bombing of Pearl Harbor, and of particular interest to Lowell folks, Conner was the last person to have seen Gerald Ellis alive.

Chief Conner will bring official war department movies of the attack on Pearl Harbor which he will show following his talk.

The idea of holding the meeting on the eve of Armistice Day is especially to accommodate those who could not be present during the day. The menu will consist of roast beef, mashed potatoes, gravy, green peas, head lettuce salad, French bread, butter, coffee and pumpkin pie. The cooking and serving is to be done entirely by the Legionnaires—a complete maie meal.

This Armistice Eve is set apart by local veterans to pay tribute to those who paid the supreme sacrifice in all wars and in the present Korean conflict, that our country might survive in peace.

Village's Share Of Road Monies Largest in Kent

Lowell's share of the third quarter Motor Vehicle Highway fund is \$2,634.40, which is the largest share going to any Kent County community outside the metropolitan area.

This money must be used to improve and maintain village streets and it is necessary to use it during the fiscal year. Lowell's street improvements planned under this fund are scheduled to begin in the spring.

Kent County's share of the third quarter is \$218,138.02. The total fund for the quarter is \$23,355,021.27.

Many Scattered Blazes Kept Fire Departments On the Run Last Week

Blazes seemed to pop up here and there all over the area, last week and the local and other fire departments were kept on the run. Some of the fires were minor and little damage was reported while others were much more serious.

Tuesday evening, Oct. 21, the Ed Burton family living on 2 1/2 Mile Rd., near Ada, lost their home and most of the contents when fire was discovered too late to save anything except a few pieces of furniture from the living room. All of their clothing, bedding, dishes and other necessities were a total loss as was the house in which they lived. Besides Mr. and Mrs. Burton there are seven children at home ranging in age from 6 to 19 years.

The house owned by William Brown and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. George Haight and three children, located about three miles southwest of Lowell on Emery Dr. was badly injured by fire Wednesday night, Oct. 29.

According to Fire Chief Dave Clark most of the furniture was saved but the attic and one end of the house was destroyed.

Wednesday evening about 7:30 the James Tiffany house near Emery Orchards caught fire and was badly damaged.

Friday morning the oil burner in Harold Finkbeiner's house trailer located at the corner of US16 and M50 intersection, leaked oil on the floor and caused a fire alarm being turned in, but Mrs. Finkbeiner called back in time to stop the fire department before they had left Lowell, as a member of the family had succeeded in putting out the blaze with little damage.

In the afternoon of the same day an alarm was turned in when the Woods house on Beckwith Drive caught fire. The damage was slight.

On Saturday a trailer used for storage at the Myers home on Nash Avenue was destroyed by fire together with its contents.
