Headlines Old Story City vs. Village Rule Voted Down in 1936

Headlines last week that Lowell was considering becoming a city, is a repetition of the story that has been carried in the Ledger off and on since 1931, soon after the legislature enacted a law which allowed villages to become cities.

In 1930 the legislature passed an Act allowing villages of 750 to 2,000 population to become fifth class cities.

On June, 1936, after several months of study and discussion, the question was brought to a vote here and was turned down 147 to 37. This was a poor vote and showed little interest had been taken in the proposal.

As we remember, the story at that time was told in a question, "Why be a fifth-class city when we are already a first-class village?"

Lowell is now able to incorporate as a home-rule city since the population has passed the 2,000 mark. In fact, by extending the boundaries to include adjacent built-up areas this village could have a population of upwards of 2,500.

Under new state laws allotting sales tax, money, road money, and other funds, it might justify such a move. The matter is still in the study stage and when and if it is brought to a vote we feel that it should be at a regular election.

Many business establishments contribute to this cause each year besides the \$200 of Legion funds voted for the purpose. Petition Filing Deadline Dec. 29 No Spring Caucus

For the first time in the history of Lowell there will be no caucus in either the village or the township for the nomination of candidates for the various offices to be elected next spring. Instead there will be Primary Election since this was voted at the last election.

According to the Revised Election Laws of 1952 the would-be candidates must file petitions signed by "at least one percent and not more than four percent of the registered voters of the township or village. The final date for filing said petitions is December 29, 1952 at 4:00 p. m. eastern standard time.

This new system might be confusing until citizens become accustomed to it, but it is said to be the fairest way to select candidates for the offices. Any of the neighboring villages and townships have tried the Primary Election method agree that it is most satisfactory and not complicated.

According to Esther M. Fahrni, clerk of Lowell township, the offices to be filled this spring are: supervisor, clerk, treasurer, two justices, a member of the Board of Review and four constables.

Louis Kingsley, clerk of the village, reports candidates for the offices of president, clerk, treasurer, 3 trustees for two years and one assessor, will be chosen at the Primaries.

The final date for registering voters for the February Primaries is Monday, Jan. 19, 1952.

City vs. Village Important Topic Rotarians Told

Our Lowell Rotary Club had a very heavy program at its regular Wednesday luncheon last week. Two hundred pounds of "Twinkle" was no small part of the "heavy" program referred to. To those of our readers who are not familiar with "Twinkle", we might mention that she is a 200-lb. sow that has been reared during the past year under the loving care of two of our local 4-H boys.

Ernie Foreman, who is so busy these days collecting nickels and dimes and also extracting (in various ways) real folding money from members of the club for the 4-H building project, stated that "Twinkle", though in the lowest bracket of the labor ladder, will earn close to \$1,000 by the end of the year. This "hogish" sum will go a long way towards the liquidation of some pressing expenses involved in the 4-H Building Fund.

Frank Stephens, our local Keeper of the Peace, made a short but eloquent speech calling for 100 volunteers to act as Ground Observers for the Air Defense program of Lowell.

Chuck Hill, program chairman, then introduced Mr. John Iglauer, Deputy City Manager of Grand Rapids who spoke on the subject. "Advantages of City versus Village Government. This difficult and involved subject was ably handled by Mr. Iglauer. At the conclusion of his prepared speech, he asked for comments and questions. He got plenty of both from many Rotarians who are intensely interested in this progressive trend in the State of Michigan of the conversion of Village into City Government.

Following is a summary and conclusions arrived at:

Basically there is little difference between a village and a small city. A city is simply a village to which has been added the right and responsibility to perform certain functions which the township now performs for its village residents. Therefore, changing from a village to a city is merely withdrawing from the township and adding the necessary township functions to the village government.

The majority of the township duties which the new city takes over are the legally required duties in connection with assessing property and collecting taxes for county and school purposes; conducting county, state and national elections; sending representatives to the Board of Supervisors; and providing a primary or justice court system. Each of these services is provided in a more efficient and more convenient manner by a city than a township, and each is done either at a lower cost or at no additional cost to city taxpayers.

From a financial standpoint, the effect of separating from the township results in a saving of virtually the entire township tax forever.

When it is realized that village residents are the only citizens in Michigan who must support and deal with, two local governments, certain other advantages of separation from the township become obvious. First, there is a general simplification of government. Second, there is a complete removal from any partisan element in local affairs. There is no change in the character of the community or in the conduct of schools or social welfare. Simultaneously with the process of incorporation as a city, there is the possibility of expanding boundaries in a much easier and more practical manner than by annexation.

There has been a steady trend of Michigan villages to change to the city form of government. The municipalities which have made the change have been well satisfied with the resulting progress.

We don't know whether the Methodist ladies who served the luncheon had a premonition or had been informed beforehand of this strenuous program but whatever the reason, they surely outdid themselves in the quantity, quality and excellent dietetic balance of the luncheon.
