



Your last-minute rush to comlete Christmas arrangement nay be your last minute to enjoy warns David G. Steinicke, Aichigan State College safety nsion specialist. The 15 hours darkness before Christmas are time to be on guard. Some of s will find it a good time to be me trimming the tree. If we follow some simple rule teinicke suggests, our Christmas will be merrier. The ordinary Christmas tree is one of the most flammable objects known—full of pitch and resin, it may take less than two minutes to burn. Firemen might be way too late. Choose a small tree-it's just beautiful and safer. Buy it eary if you like, but don't set it up until a few days before Christmas; keep it outside or in a cold place. Cut the tree trunk diagon ally one inch above the origina cut; mount the tree in a conainer of water and keep water bove the cut surface until the tree is taken down; this wil nake the tree less burnable and keep needles from falling. Erect the tree in a cool spot, shutting off nearby heat if necessary.

3 EVERGREEN SPECIES CHRISTMAS TREE LISTED The conservation department lists 13 species of evergreen used as Christmas trees, and all are suited to growth in Michigan. However, only a few of these are used in large quantities. In approximate order of popularity, these are the balsam fir, white spruce, Norway spruce, black spruce, Douglas fir, Colorado blue spruce, Scotch (Scots) pine, red pine, Austrian pine, white pine, jack pine, eastern hemlock and white cedar.




