Council Acts To Suspend New Sewer Charges

At the meeting of the council Monday night it was voted to suspend the sewer service charge until a committee of village citizens have an opportunity to study the new project and method of financing and present an acceptable solution to the council.

The water rate increase will remain in effect and the monies citizens have paid in on the sewer charge will be held until the sewer project is resumed or cancelled and credited to the patron's account. Over 10% of the patrons refused to pay the sewer charge, this along with a petition by over 200 citizens asking for a vote on the project, has forced the action of the council.

Garbage Collection May End

Roy Thompson, village garbage and refuse collector, announced to the Council on Monday night that if the bill now in the legislature requiring the boiling of all garbage for 30 minutes before feeding to hogs becomes effective he will be unable to continue to collect village garbage because of the expense. The bill passed by a large majority in the house could become effective 90 days after the governor signs it.

The council voted to participate in the Kent County civil defense fire set up, pooling fire equipment in case of attack of our cities.

Village Auditor Stoltenberg went over the village statement with the council and explained parts of the statement not completely clear to the officers. He recommended that the village clerk be relieved of his duties of providing duplicate records of the Lowell Municipal Utilities. Under his recommendation the Utility plant will write its own checks and report to the clerk and council once a month. He also recommended getting up a separate checking account for the street department, annual budget procedure, and to change the fiscal year to a more convenient time.

Plan to Widen M21

Tom Moore reported to the council that he had contacted the State Highway department to see if they would participate in widening M21 and curbing it on east and west Main street and reported a complete survey will be made by the department. A preliminary survey estimated the cost of widening M21 to 46 feet from Jackson Street to Grove St. and from the Railroad Crossing on West Main St. to the village limits at some \$80,000. The village's share of this cost would be about 25 percent which could be paid in installments from the village major street improvement fund which is received from the state.

Power Line Accident Tuesday Fatal to Leo A. Hoover, Foreman As He Contacts 6900-Volt Wire



Sudden and tragic death struck down Leo A. Hoover, 38, Lowell Municipal Plant line foreman when he accidentally came in contact with 6900 volts of electricity Tuesday morning while working a few miles west of Paris.

Leo, an employee of the plant since 1943, was called to the John M. VanDriel home at 9431 5 Mile Rd., about midnight Monday and found the transformer burning out. He returned Tuesday morning with other Lowell Power employees, Elmer Laver and Robert Steward, to install a new transformer.

The men reported that Leo volunteered to disconnect the old transformer while the other two men prepared the new one and set up the block and tackle to hoist it up the pole. Just a few minutes after climbing the pole the two heard the sputtering of high voltage and saw Hoover sag back in his safety belt unconscious. Elmer Laver immediately climbed up the pole and brought Hoover down with the block and tackle, assisted by Robert Steward. Laver was forced to cut Hoover's safety belt loose from the pole before he could be lowered.

Attempts to Revive Failed

On the ground he was wrapped in blankets and artificial respiration was administered. Aid was summoned from Rockford and Lowell and respirators were brought and used to start breathing. Hoover was rushed to Butterworth hospital in Grand Rapids with a police escort and although he was dead on arrival these physicians attempted to

revive him by massaging his heart but all efforts failed.

Thomas Moore, superintendent of the Lowell Municipal plant, said investigation showed that Hoover had placed rubber hose over the main power line, and that he was wearing rubber gloves. For some reason, Hoover had climbed higher than is normal for such work, Moore said, and his elbow first contacted the live wire.

Leo was born to John and Elizabeth Hoover on August 9, 1914 at their farm home in Keene township and has spent his entire life in and around Lowell and vicinity. He graduated from Lowell high school with the class of 1931 and started work with Lowell Municipal Light & Power in December, 1943.

Surviving besides his wife, Maxine, are four daughters, Sally, 13; Jane, 11; Mary Ann, 10, and Jill, 8; one sister, Mrs. Catherine Powers of Jackson; eight brothers, Andrew of Lansing; Henry and George of Pontiac; Michael of Grand Rapids; Aloysius of Ionia; and Jacob, Ernest and Gerald of Lowell.

Services will be held Friday at 9:30 a. m. in St. Mary's Church, Lowell, with burial in St. Mary's Cemetery. Arrangements are by the Roth Funeral Home.

Second Fatal Accident

This is the second fatal accident in the history of the plant in over fifty years. Scott Fox, village lineman, was killed while working on the village power lines at the corner of W. Main and Hudson Sts. in the early 90's.


